FAVOR SAME NUMBER.

Reapportionment of Members House of Representatives. (By Associated Press to Coos Bay

Times.) WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 9. -The House took up the bill today for the reapportionment of the House under the thirteenth census. The republican caucus favored retaining the present representation of 391 members while the democrats favor a membership of 433.
