FOUR MISSING NEVADA MEN ARE FOUND MURDERED TODAY

Sheep Men Living at Reno Thought to Be Victims of Cattle Rustlers.

BODIES DISCOVERED IN NORTHERN WASCOE

Special Train Carries Sheriff and Poses to Scene of Crime.

RENO, Nev., Feb. 11.—The dead bodies of four Reno men, who had been missing for nearly a month were found in Northern Wasco county. All had been shot to death. The victims are Harry Cambron, J. B. Laxague, B. Indiano, and Peter Erramuspe. All leave families in Reno. The news came from Eagleville, Cal. Sheriff S. P. Ferret and a force of deputies with a coroner and members of the state police have left Reno and will go in a special train to Altura, Cal., to endeavor to run down the murderers. The men were sheep men who had had trouble with cattle rustlers.

REBEL LEADERS SHOT. South American Revolutionists Given Death Penalty.

BANDON WINS COOS DEBATE

High School Teams Score Most Points In Contests Held Last Night.

The Bandon high school carried off the honors in the Coos county high school debates held at the various towns last night. Under the rules of the contest, the standing of the high schools are as follows, one point being allowed for the debate and one for each judge's vote:

Bandon won a unanimous decision in Marshfield over the Marshfield high school and won from Coquille at Bandon by a vote of two to one. Marshfield besides losing to Bandon in Marshfield lost to North Bend at North Bend by a vote of two to one.

Myrtle Point won from North Bend at Myrtle Point by a vote of two to one and at Coquille from Coquille by a vote of two to one.

Coquille lost at Bandon by a vote of two to one and in Coquille lost to Myrtle Point by a vote of two to one.

North Bend won from Marshfield at North Bend by a vote of two to one and lost to Myrtle Point at Myrtle Point by a vote of two to one.

This gives the Bandon teams the county championship.

Debates Were Good.

The debates were probably the best that have ever been held in Coos county but at most of the places, the attendance was not nearly as large as it should have been. The attendance at the Marshfield Opera House was comparatively small and in North Bend it was very small.

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Address of Abraham Lincoln

At the Dedication of Gettysburg Cemetery, the 19th Day of November, 1863.

Fourscore and seven years ago our fathers brought forth on this continent a new nation, conceived in liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal.

Now we are engaged in a great civil war, testing whether that nation, or any nation so conceived and so dedicated, can long endure.

We have met on a great battlefield of the war. We have come to dedicate a portion of that field as a final resting place for those who here gave their lives that their nation might live.

It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this.

But, in a larger sense, we can not dedicate, we can not consecrate, we can not hallow this ground.

The brave men, living and dead, who struggled here, have consecrated it far above our power to add or detract.

The world will little note, nor long remember, what we say here, but it can never forget what they did here.

It is for us, the living, rather to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced.

It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us—that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion—that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain—that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom—and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth.

CATTLE RUSTLER MAKES ESCAPE

REPORT BILL TO THE HOUSE

Canadian Reciprocity Measure Submitted With Slight Amendment.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.) WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 11.—The Canadian reciprocity agreement was favorably reported to by the House Committee on Ways and Means by a vote of twelve to seven. The committee adopted an amendment proposed by Mann of Illinois, providing that wood produced in Canada may be brought into this country free and that products of wood as specified in the bill up to a valuation of four cents a pound may be brought in free.

CHASE STAMP BILL PASSED

Coos County Senators Adds to Allowance—Other Legislative Matters.

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 11.—It was a good day for the Senators. They doubled their pay in a very simple manner. The senators receive \$3 a day for their services and this morning Senator Chase introduced a resolution for more stamps, 150 nice new 2-cent stamps for each member, making \$3 worth of the stickers. Thus, by improving the business of the Salem postmaster, the senators also doubled their compensation for February 8. Not all the senators availed themselves of this opportunity, for at least Joseph and Dimick declined with thanks, after looking over their stock of stamps.

Cut Out Pilfering.

If H. B. 359, introduced by Carter of Clackamas, should go on the statute books, wives who make a habit of attending nightly to the duty of seeing that their husbands do not leave the house in the morning overburdened with cash will have to be careful. With the cases in which husband and wife are lawfully regarded as competent witnesses against each other is listed "larceny or embezzlement by one spouse of the property of the other."

After Gallon Houses.

Among those passed by the Senate was a bill by Representative Gill to put "gallon houses" out of business. The Gill bill requires application to be made to the county court for a license to sell liquor in quantities of one gallon or over in the same manner that petitions are filed for saloons selling in small quantities. This gives the right of remonstrance. Senator Sinnott said that many "blind pigs" are carried on in his section under the guise of gallon houses.

HAVE STRATEGY BOARD.

EL PASO, Tex., Feb. 11.—A strategy board has been created for the insurrecto army now in the field with Orozco. This board will direct the movements of the troops, but none of the insurgent commanders will be moved or reduced. All will be required to operate in harmony under the direction of the strategy board which is merely to prevent jealousies among the various rebel commanders, according to the Junta here.

GILL IS OUT; DILLING IN

Seattle's New Mayor Takes Charge Today—Close Gambling Houses.

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 11.—Mayor Hiram C. Gill, recalled by the electors for alleged misconduct in office, retired at noon today without ceremony and George W. Dilling chosen to succeed him, took the office. With Gill went into political retirement also Charles W. Wapenstein, chief of police, and Richard M. Arms, superintendent of the municipal light plant. Police Captain Claude Bannick took charge of the police force as acting chief of police with instructions to close the gambling and disorderly houses. The official count of the election gives Dilling 31,919 votes, Gill 25,705 and Brown 4,690.
