OSHKOSH HULL UNINJURED.

Schooner's Masts and Upper Works Gone, but Machinery Intact.

ASTORIA, Ore., Feb. 18.—The wrecked Oshkosh lies up on the beach at the jetty sands, about half a mile south of the jetty and approximately two miles from Fort Stevens. The schooner's house, masts and upper works are gone, but the hull appears to be uninjured and the machinery is intact. It is expected that she can be easily floated on the big tides next Spring. None of the bodies of the victims of the disaster have yet been recovered.

Due Saturday.—The Redondo is due in tomorrow from San Francisco, having been delayed a day in getting away from there. She passed Point Reyes shortly before midnight last night.

Birthday Changes Meeting—Owing to Mayor E. E. Straw's thirty-fourth birthday coming on February 28, the next regular meeting of the Marshfield city council will be held Monday evening, February 27.

Teacher's Mother Dead—Mrs. Mary E. Thompson, teacher in the Central building, received word today of the death of her mother, Mrs. Mary Willig, February 7, at the family home in Wabunsee Co., Kansas, at the age of 83.

North Bend Wins.—The North Bend high school basketball team defeated the Marshfield high school team in an exhibition game there last night by a score of 36 to 10. Quite a number of students accompanied the Marshfield team to North Bend.

Ill at Portland.—Geo Goodrum, who went to Portland last week on business, is ill at a hotel there of la grippe. He intended to return here this week but was taken sick soon after his arrival. Thayer Grimes has written him not to return until he has fully recovered as he would dislike to have an epidemic of la grippe imported here from Portland now.

Sengstacken Wins.—The Oregon supreme court has reversed the decision of the lower courts in the case of Henry Sengstacken vs. Claude Nasburg. Nasburg got the decision in the circuit court. The suit started over the collection of a small account and now the costs far exceed the original amount of the difference.

May Run Here.—It is reported that the old Arcata which formerly ran in here will again enter the freight trade between Coos Bay and San Francisco for a few trips at least. The Kilbourne, which made a few trips in here but which was partly destroyed by fire last summer, is being rebuilt at San Francisco by C. P. Doe, owner of the Alliance and who may be put on the San Francisco-Eureka-Coos Bay run.

Transfers Property.—M. E. Whitmore, against whom P. A. Sandberg instituted suit for \$10,000 damages

for slander, yesterday made a trip to Coquille and filed a deed transferring his property to his wife. This is the only development in the suit.

Report Untrue.—Someone started the report today that the Golden Gate, a small vessel, had met a similar fate to the Oshkosh on the Columbia bar. A telegram from Portland says the Golden Gate has been at her dock there a week and has had no trouble whatever.
