"These holdings have enough standing timber to build an ordinary five or six room frame house for each of 16,000,000 families. If it were sawed and placed on cars it would make a train 100,000 miles long.

The largest holders of timber in this country are not cutting it. Thus they are reserving to themselves incalculable profits which will accrue with the country's growth, and the consequent diminishing of the public supply or any further conservation field. or control thereof.




