NEWS OF COQUILLE.

Events in the Valley As Recorded by The Sentinel.

Ed Dyer and assistants are at work this week remodeling the two stories in the south front of the National bank building, cutting portions of the partition between two rooms, constructing balcony and making other changes in the rooms. After April first the rooms will be occupied by the firm of Lyon and Jones.

Died—At his residence on the river below Coquille, Friday, February 10, 1911, Henry G. Hathaway, aged 80 years, 10 months and 1 day.

The local saw mill started up last week and trued up the shafts and got all the belting of the mill in as good shape as possible. On Monday of this week the sawing of the timbers for the repairs of the mill was begun and the mill was run for three days on this work. Many small difficulties were encountered but considering the time the mill has been out of operation these were not unexpected. On Monday of this week W. D. Newton, formerly of the Johnson mill took the superintendency of the plant and will in future have full charge of the mill and yards.

Edwin Ellingsen and a crew of men are this week at work leveling off the lots directly back of the Pointer barn with the intention of building. The lumber is also being hauled to the location and the work of putting up the building will be pushed as rapidly. Just what use will be made of the building when completed has not yet been decided.
