ROSEBURG, Ore., Feb. 22.—Sheriff George Quine has received a message conveying the sad intelligence that his brother-in-law, Christopher Leadgergood, passed away at Bandon. The deceased was about 60 years of age, and prior to 14 years ago lived in Douglas county. He had been in poor health for some time, and about a month ago made preparations to seek relief in California. On the day he was scheduled to start on the southern trip he became worse, and gradually grew weaker until he expired. Mr. Quine leaves for Gardiner, and in the event nothing unforeseen occurs, he will continue his journey to Bandon to attend the funeral. He is survived by a wife and daughter, both of whom reside at Bandon.

# OPEN OFFICES FOR RAILWAY

Fine Railway Rumor Put In Circulation About Projects Here.

"The entire third floor of the Coke building has been leased for Railroad offices." This was the sensational bit of railroad news that was started in circulation yesterday and the way it traveled was something wonderful to behold.

Just what need any project would have of office room that would be ample for transcontinental line in full operation no one appeared to be aware.

"That must be the Coos Bay and Boise that has it," answered Supt. W. F. Miller of the Southern Pacific, when asked about it. "We have lots of office room down at the depot. No, I haven't heard any news of work starting on the Coos Bay line. I don't know just when Mr. Millis will return."

Claude Nasburg, secretary of the Coos Bay and Boise said that he heard that it was the Southern Pacific that had leased the Coke building.

Dorsey Kreitzer, who collects the rent of the building hadn't been apprised to any one renting the building.

Judge Coke said it was all news to him. However, if any railroad that would build to Coos Bay was being held back for lack of office room, he said he would vacate his office and thought that some others would do the same.

The report had it the lease was made directly with W. S. Chandler who is now in San Francisco.

### Get Workmen.

Another rumor afloat was that General Manager Millis and Contractor Sweeney were shipping six hundred men and teams here to begin work at once on the Southern Pacific line to Coos Bay. No one appeared to know where it started.

## BIG EGGS LAID BY MARSHFIELD HEN

A. L. Foster of South Marshfield Has "Biddy" That Is Vying for the Large Hen Fruit Record.

A. L. Foster of South Marshfield has a hen that is making a new record for producing large eggs. Last season, the hen which was then but a pullet laid at least forty double-yolked eggs. This year she has been laying ordinary eggs but considerably larger than the average. Yesterday he found another of the hen's large eggs. The egg appears to have three yolks in it and is 8 5-8 inches around the long way and 6 3-4 inches in circumference. The egg weighs just four ounces. The hen is a cross between the Black Minorca and the Buff Cochin. Mr. Foster has placed the egg on exhibit at the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce.
