Government Announces Mild Form of Military Rule Effective.

MARTIAL LAW IN MEXICO.

(By Associated Press.) MEXICO CITY, Mar. 11.—The government today decided to suspend the constitutional guarantee throughout the republic. This means a mild form of martial law.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Mar. 11.—The gunboat Princeton, now at Panama has been ordered northward, touching at Acapulco, Mexico and probably other Mexican ports while the gunboat Yorktown will sail southward from San Diego also with orders to stop at several Mexican ports.

These orders are in conjunction with those issued a few days ago. The gunboats Tacoma and the scout cruiser Chester will establish a patrol of the United States vessels along both coasts of Mexico.

BAILEY WITNESS IN BRIBERY CASE

Texas Senator Wanted to Explain His Connection With Alleged Bribery in Lorimer's Election.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Mar. 11.—State's Attorney Burke today ordered a subpoena duces tecum for United States Senator Joseph W. Bailey of Texas summoning him as a witness in the case against State Senator John S. Broderick of Chicago charged by Former State Senator David H. Holstlaw with paying him \$2,500 on July 16, 1909, in Broderick's saloon in Chicago for Holstlaw's vote for Lorimer for United States Senator. Holstlaw produced a deposit slip with that amount on the State bank of Chicago in which bank he said he had deposited the money. The deposit slip was taken to Washington by a sub-committee investigating Lorimer's election and the last knowledge of the whereabouts of the slip was when Bailey held it in his hand during his speech in the Senate in defense of Lorimer and denounced it as a forgery. Bailey's explanation is that while he was addressing the Senate some one took the slip from his hand. He cannot remember who it was. Broderick's case is set for trial March 20.

PLAN ATTACK FOR TONIGHT

Mexican Rebels Say They Will Capture Town Near San Diego.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Mar. 11.—"We will attack Tia Juana tonight," says a message sent to sub-prefecto Jo Laques in command of the forces at the little Mexican town across the boundary line from San Diego today by the filibustering force of Mexicans under the leadership of the half-breed negro named Francisco Salinas. The force is camped 20 miles east of Tia Juana and is said to number 140 men. At noon the band, it was said, had begun marching to Tia Juana.

NO CALL FOR MORE TROOPS

General Wood Decides That There Are Enough Now On Border.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Mar. 11.—No additional troops have been ordered to Texas or California nor are such orders in contemplation at the present time according to General Leonard Wood, chief of staff.

His statement is in answer to a report that the War Department was preparing to send another division to the southern frontier. It is made clear officially in Army circles that the forces in process of mobilization at San Antonio, Galveston and San Diego are adequate for present needs.

The War Department, however, is recruiting the infantry regulars of Major General Carter's division at San Antonio to their full strength. The division now numbers about 10,000 enlisted men and it is expected it will be increased to 16,000 by the addition of recruits in the ordinary way.

FEAR INDIANS WILL REVOLT

SPOKANE, Wash., Mar. 11.—War may be declared by the Indians on the Fort George reserve in British Columbia against the white settlers who are crowding them from their land. Father Bellot, a priest, who has returned to Nelson, B. C., predicts trouble with the Indians.

He declares it will be necessary for the provincial government to make up the losses the Red men are suffering at the hands of whites to prevent war.

REBELS AWAIT ACT OF TROOPS

Decide to Suspend Active Operations in Mexico Pending Developments.

MEXICALI, Mex., Mar. 11.—By an order from the revolutionary Junta in Los Angeles the departure of the rebels from Ensenada, was deferred. The Junta has decided to suspend all but defensive measures until it becomes more evident what the United States army is to do along the border. "If the United States intends to take Mexico, there is no use wasting lives and money fighting for liberty," said Simon Berthold today. "We will wait until Washington shows its hand, although it appears that the mobilization of troops at the border can mean but one thing—the occupation and annexation of Mexico. If that be true, all the work we have done will go for naught."

GOOD TIMES JUST AHEAD

J. Albert Matson Reports Business Conditions Rapidly Improving.

J. Albert Matson, who has just returned from an extended stay in San Francisco, reports general business conditions improving rapidly.

"There is a strong undercurrent of enthusiastic optimism in San Francisco that is certain indication not only of good times ahead, but lively times. Real estate is commencing to change hands at advancing prices and parties with unimproved property are making arrangements for building on an extensive scale."

"The basis of all this feeling that several good business years are ahead of San Francisco and other portions of the Pacific coast is a solid foundation of large improvements already decided upon. Someone with a penchant for figures has stated that the amounts already appropriated for expenditure in and around San Francisco amounts to about \$4,000,000 a month for the next four years. This includes \$75,000,000 that the Southern Pacific has determined on for electrification of ferries, trolley extensions and terminals; \$20,000,000 for the exposition and other expenditures that make a grand total that is making even the solid citizens of the Bay City dizzy with joy and hope. Of course, joy, I know, is sometimes caused by hope that is nothing but "hop" with an "e" on it, but in this case it is different. The whole coast is in for several big business years and Coos Bay is bound to get her share of the general prosperity."

LARGE ESTATE OF MRS. EDDY

Property Left By Her Is Appraised at Nearly \$3,000,000.

Repays Kindness of California Rancher by Attacking Family.

WOUNDED WOMAN CRAWLS FOR AID

Slayer Escapes and Posses Are Hot On His Trail—Fear Violence.

IGNACIO, Cal., Mar. 11.—A ranchman named Lafranchi and his 19 year old nephew, Albert were shot and killed, and Mrs. Rose Lafranchi shot in the leg today by an unknown Italian whom they had given lodging overnight. The murderer is pursued by two posses of armed ranchmen. The murder was entirely unprovoked. Mrs. Lafranchi with two bullets in her legs dragged herself half a mile to the nearest neighbor and gave the alarm. The feeling is high and it is believed the officers of the law will have difficulty in saving the murderer from violence.

ARONQUIST IS NOW MISSING

Light Tender In Harbor Thought to Have Been Drowned Tuesday Night.

John Aronquist, who has had charge of lighting the harbor lights on Coos Bay for the past twelve years, has turned up missing and is supposed to have been drowned Tuesday night while looking after the lights in the lower harbor. His boat was found near Porter yesterday by Chas. Hunsecker. It was in good condition but there is nothing to indicate the whereabouts of the owner.

Aronquist left here about ten minutes after nine o'clock Tuesday evening and has not been seen by any one since. It is said that in the twelve years he has had charge of lighting the harbor lights, he never missed a night until after his disappearance this week.

John Haynes and other friends of the deceased feel certain that he must have accidentally fallen in and been drowned.

Aronquist had no relatives here and lived in a float house on North Front street.

SUSPECT HELD AT ENSENADA

Man Suspected of Exploding Dynamite, Being Rebel Agent and Murderer Caught.
