Many of this season's hats for the wee ones are miniature replicas of their mothers' "creations," but somehow or other they seem less freakish when they cover the bonny little pates. The hat in the picture is known variously as the lamp shade or flowerpot model. It is made of black shirred satin and is adorned with a single white rosette of ribbon. This is one of the

newest and most modish of the winter shapes.

The other hat illustrated is an advance spring model that will be worn much by the fashionable little ladies when the grass grows again and the flowers bloom, not alone on millinery, but in the ground. It is one of the prettiest of the styles shown by one of the most fashionable of the folk whose business it is to dress little ones. To Test the Air of a Room.

Take an empty wide necked bottle capable of holding just nine and one-half fluid ounces of water. Into this empty bottle pour half an ounce of lime-water. Let the bottle remain uncovered in the room all night. If in the morning the lime-water is milky the ventilation is very bad indeed. If the lime-water becomes milky on your covering the bottle mouth with your hand and shaking the vessel the ventilation is not sufficiently good. If the lime-water remains clear the air of the room is pure.

For Use Next Spring.

Before putting away winter boots and shoes well rub them all over with vaseline—soles included—piece in a box and leave till required. This preserves the leather and prevents cracking.

Rice Dumplings.

Pick and wash a pound of rice and boil it gently in two quarts of water till it becomes dry, keeping the pot well covered and not stirring. Then take it off the fire and spread it out to cool on the bottom of an inverted sieve, loosening the grains lightly with a fork that all the moisture may evaporate. Pare a dozen apples or other large, juicy apples and scoop out the core, then fill up the cavity with marmalade or with lemon and sugar. Cover every apple all over with a thick coating of the boiled rice. Tie up each in a separate cloth and put them into a pot of cold water. They will require about an hour and a quarter after they begin to boil, perhaps longer.

When You Wish to Dance.

To prepare a floor for dancing sprinkle freely with a mixed powder of spermaceti and French chalk, rubbing it with a broom wrapped in a duster. This gives a capital polish. It must be done when the floor is dry.
