NINE-HOUR LAW RULING. United States Supreme Court Passes On It. (By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.) WASHINGTON, D. C., Mar. 13. — Railroads, which employ telegraph operators for six hours and then after an interval for three hours more

comply with the federal "hours of service" law of 1907, according to a decision of the United States Supreme Court today. The government contended the service must be nine consecutive hours.
