PORT ORFORD VOTES BONDS

Issues Carries By Almost Unanimous Vote—Better Boat Service.

(Special to The Times)

PORT ORFORD, Ore., Mar. 17.—The special school election held in Port Orford school district on Saturday to vote upon the \$5,000 bond issue was practically unanimous for the bonds—the vote being Bonds—"Yes" 49; Bonds—"No" 2. The board of education will proceed immediately to dispose of the bonds, and as soon as arrangements can be made, let the contract for the building that it may be ready for school in the fall. The activity of the Commercial club in boosting the bond issue practically eliminated all opposition.

In addition to the school building, seventeen residences are planned for construction here this summer. The shingle mill has resumed work after a month's shut-down; and it is stated on good authority that some Wyoming and Missouri parties will put in another saw mill and have it in operation by September 1st.

Representatives of the Eatabrook Company were in Port Orford last week and made arrangements to have the steamer Fifield plying between Bandon and San Francisco, stop on up trips, giving Port Orford direct boat service with the city again for the first time since the earthquake.

REPORT UNFOUNDED.

A report in circulation here today that the Alliance would not make another trip here was characterized by Agent McGeorge as being absolutely without foundation. Mr. McGeorge said that the vessel's business has increased considerably lately and that a change was not considered.
