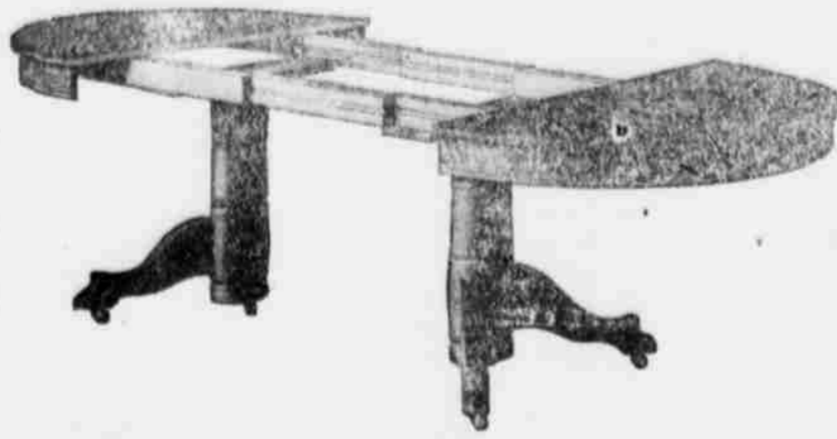

MARSHFIELD SCHOOL NEWS

◆ HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING. ◆

The National Educational association will meet in San Francisco, July 8-14. An effort is being made to secure a large attendance of teachers from Oregon this year. At present Oregon has made only 26 active members; only six other states and territories having a smaller active membership. There are two kinds of membership in the association; active and associate. The active membership at present is 7,000. The membership fee is \$2.00. Active members pay an additional initiation fee of \$2.00. All members receive the printed proceedings of the meeting and this is considered a valuable document. Several teachers from Marshfield schools are planning to attend this great gathering.

Arbor Day, April 17, will be observed throughout the school. Programs of songs, drills, and recitations will be given. The occasion will be utilized for exhibiting school work. At the South Marshfield school a general program will be given in the assembly hall, and at the Central school, a part of the exercises will be given in general assembly. All parents and citizens of the city are invited to attend the programs and look over the work.

The athletics of the High school were organized during the past week. The boys of the High school formed an athletic association and adopted a constitution. One feature of the new constitution is an executive committee of five members with power to supervise the finances, exercise directive control over the athletic managers, etc. The present officers are: President, Chauncey Clarke; vice-president, Eric Bolt; secretary, Leslie Isaacson; treasurer, John Ferguson; delegate Coos county high school association, Chauncey Clarke. SINGS AT OWN FUNERAL.

William Faxon Lies Dead While Phonograph Sounds His Songs.

OID, Mich., Mar. 15.—William Faxon's voice was heard at his own funeral here. While his body lay in a casket, those gathered to pay final tribute heard two hymns by him and also heard him as one of a trio, including his son and daughter, in sacred songs. When the mourners had gathered in the parlor of the Faxon home, in which his open coffin lay, they were surprised to hear his voice pealing an anthem from behind a screen of flowers and palms. Three years ago, believing his life was nearing its close, Faxon conceived the idea of preserving his voice to be used at the service when he died. He used a phonograph, and the records were reproduced before he was buried. Faxon was 90 years old. He was the first Methodist convert in this district, and built a church for that faith. Almost until the time of his death he participated regularly in the song service.
