Was Prominent in Washington and Idaho Years Ago.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Mar. 20.—Joseph R. Lewis, 81 years of age, former territorial judge of Idaho and later territorial judge and territorial chief justice of Washington, died at his home here yesterday.

**MYRTLE POINT POINTERS.**

News of Upper Coquille Valley From The Enterprise.

Manager J. D. Clinton of the Coquille Valley Telephone company, states that the phones have been added to the exchange since the first of the year.

At the meeting of the directors of the Myrtle Point Canning company held last week, the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: C. E. Huling, president; W. E. Pike, vice president; L. A. Roberts, secretary and T. D. Guerin, treasurer. For the purpose of getting uniformity of vegetable product for the cannery, it was agreed that the company should secure the necessary seed and retail it to the farmer and gardeners. It was also agreed that an expert processor should be secured, and the directors are now in correspondence with a man who is recommended as a good one for the position.

At the regular monthly meeting of the Myrtle Point fire department Monday evening, Dr. J. L. Masson resigned as chief, and S. E. Dietz, assistant, was chosen to fill the office.

Workmen are making a showing at the cannery, since the heavier timbers have been received. The foundation has been laid and most of the lower floor joists are in place. W. L. Mast is foreman of the carpenter work.

Postmaster H. B. Steward is rejoicing over the recovery of a valued opal ring which was presented to him some 29 years ago by an old lady friend, now dead, who lived in California. He was wearing the ring about a year ago when doing some work in the cemetery, at which time it was lost. It was found during the past week by Mrs. W. A. King. Mr. King proposed to advertise it, but found the owner through inquiry and returned the ring to Mr. Steward.

S. R. Loshbaugh of Bridge has traded his property in that neighborhood to Walter McDonald of Bandon, and Mr. Donald is moving up to take possession this week. Mr. Loshbaugh will remain a couple of months to help in the saw mill and then expects to move to Bandon to make his home.

Thos. Vert and E. E. Farber of this city expects to join several families from Coquille and leave soon for Mexico, where they have bought farm property, which is located in the southern part of the republic. It is understood that about a dozen Coos county families expect to form the colony.

She had been in the asylum once before—a few years ago.

Many at Concert.—The band concert given by the Coos Bay Naval Reserve Band in the Marshfield city park yesterday was enjoyed by a large audience yesterday. The weather was fine and the program and rendition excellent.

Fuel Coal.—According to the government report, Coos Bay furnished 12,200 tons of fuel coal to coastwise vessels during the year 1910. This is about 1,500 tons less than was supplied the previous year. The total value of the coal supplied was \$37,954, an average price of \$3.11 per ton.
