Four Machines.—Tom Goodale and Billy Wade plan to put three Hudson autos and one Chalmers-Detroit machine in the Roseburg-Coos Bay passenger service as soon as the roads will permit. All are five passenger machines.

Improves Ranch.—Anson Rogers is building a fine new wharf and bathhouse at his south Coos River ranch to replace the old ones which were more or less damaged by the floods a year ago.

Moves to Portland.—Geo. N. Farrin will leave tomorrow for Portland where he will enter the law office of Beach, Simon & Nelson. He will move his family to Portland at the conclusion of the school year here.

School Closed.—The Libby school has been closed, owing to many families moving from there subsequent to the closing down of the mine. D. L. Rood taught the last term. Some of the pupils have entered in the Marshfield schools to complete the year.

More Mains.—The Coos Bay Water Company is planning to put in some new mains, sixty tons of iron pipe now being en route here. They recently installed a large meter at the pumping station, showing capacity of 5,000,000 gallons in twenty-four hours.

Nann Smith In.—The Nann Smith arrived in today from Bay Point, making her twelfth trip in twelve weeks, a new record for Capt. Olson, and the big lumber carrier. It is likely that he will get out Sunday morning. The Hazle Dollar, one of the biggest lumber carriers on the coast, will probably be in here next month to load.

Naval Reserve Exams.—The competitive examination for the appointment of the Oregon Naval Reserves will be conducted at the Marshfield High school building next Monday evening at 7:30 o'clock. Most of the members are planning to take the examination which will be under the supervision of the commanding officer, R. O. Graves.

Inherits Property.—It is reported that Mrs. J. Virgil Pugh, formerly of North Bend, has inherited a large estate left by the late J. M. Shaban, formerly of Empire, who died last week in Los Angeles. He was a wealthy bachelor and Mrs. Pugh

was his niece. Mr. Pugh recently filed a petition in bankruptcy, listing his liabilities at about \$30,000 and his assets at \$54,000. While on the Bay, Mr. Shaban was interested in some of Major Kinney's projects and among the securities in his estate is said to be a \$25,000 mortgage on some of the Kinney property.

Builds House.—Otto Hill is erecting a house on the ranch on lower Coos River which he recently purchased.

Injures Foot.—J. R. O'Neil of the Hoeck logging camp on South Coos River severely cut his foot while at work in the camp this week.

Sues Company.—F. K. Gettins has begun suit against Judge K. I. Perky, J. R. Good, Guy C. Barnum and other Idaho people, who own the Boise addition tract here, for \$680.

Use Electric Power.—J. H. Levers of the Oregon Power Company has closed a contract with the Coos Bay Steam Laundry by which electric power will be substituted for steam in the operation of all their machinery. The installation of the new motors will be made as soon as possible.

Returns to Bay.—R. E. Pinegor, who has been making his home at Portland for the past six months, has returned to Marshfield and will probably locate here. Mr. Pinegor reports that Portland is not booming as much as some suppose. He says that during the winter, a large number of men were out of employment and even now, though the spring work has started, many are out of work owing to the large influx of workmen from the east. He visited several other northern Oregon towns and says that none of them looked as good as Coos Bay.

Father Delayed.—E. Busby yesterday went to North Bend to meet the Breakwater, expecting his aged father here from Lewiston, Idaho, for a visit. He didn't find him and thought that may be the latter had missed him some way. He was quite worried until he received a letter from his sister at Lewiston stating that their father had gone down to the depot to take the train, but met an old acquaintance and got so interested in the conversation that the train pulled out and left him. However, he expects to get here on the next Breakwater sure.
