## FIELD MEET IN MARSHFIELD CASTLE DREAM IS SHATTERED

Financial Charge Of It Turned Over to Local School—Basketball Contest.

At a meeting of the representatives of the Coos County High schools at Coquille this week, it was agreed that the Marshfield High school should have the entire financial management of the Coos County interscholastic meet which will be held here early in May. The plan is to have Marshfield shoulder all the expenses and to take whatever profits may accrue from the event. It is believed this will simplify matters considerably.

At the meeting, it was also decided that the Bandon and Myrtle Point High school basketball teams should settle the controversy over the Coos county championship and a game to be played in Coquille Saturday, April 1. Bandon and Myrtle Point had been unable to agree on the decisive game, Myrtle Point objecting to the Coquille hall. It was finally decided that the game should be played in the open air if the weather permits and if not in the Masonic hall there.

McDoner of North Bend and Stanley Briggs of Marshfield were chosen as umpire and referee, they to alternate in these positions. O. Knowlton of Coquille was chosen as alternate. Superintendent Raab of North Bend and Superintendent Tiedgen of Marshfield were selected as timekeepers, Superintendent Hockett of Coquille as scorer.

Mrs. Emily McFarlin-Lewis Asks Divorce From T. J. Lewis—No Castle.

"The Castle in Wales" which T. J. Lewis, formerly coroner of Coos county and well-known in Marshfield for years as undertaker, claimed to have inherited proved to be merely a "Castle in the air" according to the divorce petition of Mrs. Emily Lewis, just filed with County Clerk Watson.

It will be remembered that Mrs. Lewis' announcement of his inheritance of the Castle in Wales and the big estate there preceded but a few weeks his unexpected marriage to Mrs. Emily McFarlin, widow of the late cranberry king of Coos county. They disposed of the McFarlin holdings here and left for the north, but after the lapse of a few months, they returned to Coos Bay and soon afterwards separated, Mr. Lewis leaving.

In her petition, Mrs. Lewis states that she does not know the present whereabouts of Mr. Lewis and has been granted service by publication. She asks that the matrimonial bonds be severed and that she be permitted to resume her former name, Emily O. McFarlin and that Mr. Lewis' claim to any interest in her property be set aside.

Mrs. Lewis is now living on the McFarlin ranch, which she regained, on North Inlet.
