Candidates for Annual City Election Are Named.

The city caucus for the purpose of placing in nomination candidates for city office was held at the city hall Wednesday evening. Mayor J. R. Benson presiding as chairman and L. C. Bargelt secretary, both being chosen by acclamation.

Nominations for two councilmen being declared in order, five names were proposed and the four below named having received the four highest votes were declared the nominees: Frank Schroeder, Jake Strong, W. E. Lewellen and Chas. Southmayd.

J. S. Whitaker and R. C. Dement were named by acclamation as candidates for councilmen for the two-year term. No names were opposed to J. M. Arrington and I. E. Rose, present incumbents as city treasurer and city recorder, respectively, and they were nominated by acclamation. J. R. Benson and W. T. Dement having been placed before the caucus as candidates for mayor, the nominations were declared closed and they were declared the nominees by acclamation.—Myrtle Point Enterprise.
