Their names and ages are: Ashbell, Archer and Austia, triplets, 41/2 years old; Arthur and Arnold, twins, 3 1/2 years old; Allan, Almon and Albin, triplets, 214 years old: Albert, Albion and Adolph, triplets, 18 months old: Abel and Abner, twins, 6 months old.

"The mother and children are now in Highland, Kan., while the father is in Oklahoma seeking a suitable location for his large and promising family. He probably will buy some cheap Indian land through the Indian agency at Muskogee."
