PORTLAND IS GROWING.

New City Directory Indicates 252,621 People.

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 31.—The new Portland city directory contains 112,276 names, which according to the directory company's way of figuring, should give Portland and suburbs a population of 252,621, and for the first time the company is using 2 1/4 as a multiple instead of 2 1/2—that is multiplying the number of names in the directory by 2 1/4 to find out approximately how many people there are in town. The lower multiple is used because of the recent increase in single male population owing to the rapid growth of the city and state.

Smiths are still in the lead in Portland according to the new directory. There are 1230 of them—more than there are in Fort Smith, Ark., or any other place with the name Smith in it. But the strong Scandinavian element in Portland is shown by the way in which the Johnsons and Johnstons are crowding them—there are 1140 in the directory who carry one or the other of those names.

The Andersons, who usually rank the Smiths, are far behind, there being but 774 in the new book of who's who in Portland. After them come 676 Browns, 518 Joneses, 473 Willsons, 436 Williamses, 389 Olsons and 381 Hansons.
