Stanley Williams, Former Quartermaster of Ninth Infantry.

SUCCEEDS GEN. LEYVA AT MEXICALI TODAY

Both He and Predecessor Liable to Be Prosecuted by America.

MEXICALI, Mexico, April 1.—General Stanley, the American leader of the rebels in Lower California, took full command today of the Insurrectos of Mexicali.
Leyva, the deposed commander, has departed and is supposed to be on his way to Los Angeles. If Leyva is caught, he is liable to be prosecuted for violation of the neutrality laws of the United States carrying with it a penalty of two years' imprisonment as he with Berthold organized the original rebel force in Holtville, Cal., last January. It became known today that Stanley's real name is Stanley Williams, formerly quartermaster of the Ninth Infantry, U. S. A. If he should be driven across the line, he might be arrested by American troops and tried for desertion.

TRIED TO ROB SELLWOOD BANK

RALPH L. BLOSSER SAID TO HAVE CONFESSED TO ATTEMPTED CRIME NEAR PORTLAND—FOLLOWS WIFE'S SUICIDE.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 1.—Last Saturday an attempt was made to rob the Sellwood Bank, a small suburban financial institution. The robber had cut his way into the bank through the basement and bound and gagged the janitor who was laying in wait for the cashier but was frightened away.

Today Ralph L. Blosser, a tinner by occupation, was arrested and is alleged to have confessed that he attempted to rob the Sellwood bank. Last Tuesday afternoon the body of Mrs. Grace Blosser was found lying in a bed at their home. She died by poison and was believed to have committed suicide though no good reason for such an act on her part was found. The confession of Blosser's death through chagrin over the discovery of her husband's alleged misdeeds, may have caused her to take her own life.

PACKERS TRY TO AVOID TRIAL

Now Set Up Contention That Anti-Trust Law Is Unconstitutional

CHICAGO, Ill., April 1.—Demurrers filed by the indicted Chicago packers today with Judge Carpenter of the United States District court set up the contention that the anti-trust act under which all the monopoly suits are brought in the United States does not create any crime. The basis of the contention is that the statute does not define any offense against the United States with sufficient certainty to inform defendants of the nature of the crime with which they are charged, and the same in so far as it undertakes to create a crime is invalid, void and contrary to the United States constitution. The indictments are also attacked as faulty preparation.

BIG CHURCH IS BURNED TODAY

St. James, Catholic Edifice at San Francisco, Destroyed With \$100,000 Loss.

HILMAN MUST GO TO PRISON

Seattle Multi-Millionaire Real Estate Dealer Is Sentenced.

Plot to Loot County Treasurer's Office In Iowa Fails.

DEPUTY IS BOUND; ROBBERS FRIGHTENED

Several Arrests Made and Deputy Official Is Suspected.

DES MOINES, Ia., April 1.—Seven arrests were made today in an effort to apprehend the four men who shortly before midnight bound and gagged Deputy County treasurer G. W. Keller and tried to dynamite the vault of the county treasurer's office which contained \$100,000. On what is said by the police to be a confession from Al Rhodes, the first of the men arrested, Deputy County Treasurer James O'Callaghan has been held.

O'Callaghan is a brother of Robert O'Callaghan, the Western League baseball manager. With Rhodes and O'Callaghan the police are holding Barret Lynch and wife, Mrs. Rhodes, Clayton Bayles and an unknown man. The attempted robbery was a failure. The first charge of nitroglycerine shattered the door but the men were frightened away before another could be prepared.

CARPENTERS ARE ON STRIKE

Thousands of Men In St. Louis and Kansas City Demand More Pay.

California Supreme Court Refuses Grant Relief to Jack Johnson.
