**Sends Samples.**—Dr. E. Mings, city health officer has sent three samples of the Coos Bay water to the State Board of Health for analysis. It will probably be a week or more before he hears from them.

**Is Some Better.**—A. H. Powers who has been laid up with an attack of Sciatic rheumatism for several days is reported some better today but he is still confined to his home. He was unable to attend the council meeting last night.

**Will Give Benefit.**—A benefit performance for Mrs. Francis Hatton, the actress who was injured at the Royal theatre recently, will be given by Harry Hollingsworth and company at the Masonic theatre Thursday night. Mrs. Hatton is recovering slowly from the effects of her injuries

and still suffers severe pains in the head from it.

**Next Wednesday.**—The Ladies Aid of the M. E. church will meet at 2:30 Wednesday at the parsonage. Miss Muehler will speak.

**Order Ties.**—It was reported today that E. Conklin, who has been employed by the Simpson Lumber company, has taken a contract for getting out 20,000 railroad ties in the South Inlet section, presumably for use in repairing the local railway tracks.

**Are Recovering.**—Dorsey Kretzer and wife are recovering from the injuries sustained in the auto accident Sunday. Mr. Kretzer is able to get around on crutches and expects to be able to get down town tomorrow. Mrs. Kretzer is also able to be up and around.

**Water Tests.**—Manager J. H. Flanagan of the Coos Bay Water Company has secured samples of the city water here and North Bend which he is sending away to chemists for analysis to ascertain whether the analysis of the State Board of health or the one of the water company is correct.

**HILL LINE TO EUREKA SOON**

**Railroad Men Who Investigated Coos Bay Visit Humboldt Bay.**

The Eureka Herald says: "If straws show which way the wind blows, it will not be long before it will be blowing in construction operations on a north coast railroad to connect Eureka and Portland by rail, possibly on the coast lines."

"After a special automobile trip to Crescent City, Oregon, and a visit to the town of Eureka, Mr. Eddy and H. Summers, especially concerned to be right in their opinion, in the service of the Hill interests, departed on the City of Portland for Humboldt Bay with all the maps and information obtainable of the territory through which they had just passed in their possession."

"It has been but a month or two since work was commenced on the construction of a Grants-Pass-Crescent-City line. While this road is said to be in the course of construction by a small company, it is believed to be but a branch of the Southern Pacific."

"The Grants Pass-Crescent City line is simply another method by which the Southern Pacific undoubtedly hopes to accomplish a speedy connection with the Northwestern Pacific now being completed into Eureka from San Francisco. The railroads from north and south will meet here."

"The Hill interests for a long period have been planning to enter the California coast section. This ambition of the northern railroad magnate has kept the Harriman system busy devising means and ways by which to keep him out of this rich territory."

"Now the situation seems to have reached the stage where a road must be built and both systems, Hill and Harriman, are determined to build. This means that two lines can be expected to connect Eureka with the northern centers by coast lines."

"For some time past Hill has been forging down through Central Oregon. He is now headed into the Coos Bay territory, and will probably strike due south along the coast for Crescent City and Eureka."

"That Hill is looking after Coos Bay is believed beyond the question of a doubt. According to the Coos Bay Times of February, Messrs. Eddy and Summers, who paid Eureka such a hurried visit, also visited Marshfield, North Bend and other Coos Bay cities, securing there as here, all possible data and maps of the region, and neither affirming or denying that they are working for Hill."

"Messrs. Eddy and Hill while in Eureka yesterday interviewed Peter Belcher and looked over all maps available in Mr. Belcher's offices, giving out the impression that they were expert lumbermen of Portland. They gave considerable attention to the maps of Del Norte county, evidently looking for those sections of possible new railroad territory where the timber is standing thickest and freight shipments will be of the largest quantities. At the conclusion of their visit to the Belcher offices Mr. Belcher showed them through the Elks' hall, a treat which they appreciated greatly."

"It would appear from the hurry in which the visitors passed through this section that some railroad plans for new lines to the south from Oregon are to be made and that haste is imperative."

**Defeats S. C. Bartrum in Race For State Forester.**

**SALEM, Ore., April 4.**—F. A. Elliott of Salem, was elected state forester over S. C. Bartrum of Roseburg, at the first meeting of the new state board of forestry. Members of the board say that Elliott was selected because of his long practical experience in the timber industry, and that he will devote his time largely to the practical work of the office, while his deputy will have charge of the work in the office itself and the publicity features in connection with a campaign to ward off the destruction of vast timbered resources by fire.

Only one vote was taken, Mr. Elliott receiving four, the other three going to Mr. Bartrum.

State Forester Elliott has been employed by the Spalding Logging company, of this city, and has been engaged in various capacities in the timber business for 30 years. At one time he was at the head of the Oregon & California fire fighting forces, organizing them and keeping the company's loss to the lowest notch.
