SUMMER RATE IS ANNOUNCED

Railways Fix Tourist Passenger Rates and Dates From Portland.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 4.—East-bound tourist and convention rates for 1911 have just been announced by the North Pacific Coast Passenger association, to apply to all transcontinental lines out of Portland. The summer tourist rates will be the same as in years past, to eastern terminals and beyond and to Colorado common points, as follows:

Dates of sales: May 16, 17, 18, 19, 22, 23, 24, 25, 27, 28, 29. June 5, 7, 9, 10, 12, 16, 17, 21, 22, 28, 29, 30. July 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 19, 20, 26, 27, 28. August 3, 4, 5, 14, 15, 16, 17, 21, 22, 23, 28, 29, 30. September 1, 2, 4, 5, 6, 7. Basis rates same as last year to eastern terminals Duluth, St. Paul, Minneapolis, Omaha, Council Bluffs, Kansas City, etc., \$60 round trip. Chicago, \$72.50; St. Louis, \$70, and proportionately low fares to other points.

Limits: Going limit 15 days. Final return limit October 31.

Stopovers: Allowed Chicago, St. Louis, etc., and points west. Convention rates will be as follows: To Atlantic City, N. J., for large conventions there, viz., Presbyterian church, May 17 to June 1; Christian Endeavor, July 6 to 12; Elks, July 10 to 15. Sales dates May 12 and 13, June 28, 29, 30, July 1 to 6 inclusive. Rate \$102.40.

To Colorado Springs, Denver, Pueblo, for Dry Farming congress, at Colorado Springs, sales dates October 12, 13, 14. Rate \$55.

To Detroit, Mich., for Knights of Columbus, August, sales dates July 26 to 28. Rate \$81.

To Minneapolis, Minn., for Royal Arcanum, May 17 and 25, sales dates May 12 and 13. Rate \$60.

To Rochester, N. Y., for Shriners, July 11 to 13; G. A. R. September 4 to 9, sales dates June 20, July 1 to 6 inclusive, August 14 to 17 inclusive. Rate \$91.35.

Limits and stopovers for conventions will be the same as summer tourist rates.

The transcontinental lines have issued a tariff naming rates to Portland for Rose Festival, tickets on sale from eastern terminals May 29, 30 and 31 (after which regular summer tourist rates in effect), basis \$60 for round trip, returning over direct line or via Missouri river points, \$81.75 returning through California.

Regular summer tourist tickets westbound are on sale daily June 1 to September 30, with final return limit of October 31.

FIGHT TALK IN CITY COUNCIL

pled Mayor Straw. And he also added a number of other things.

"Gentlemen don't do that sort of thing," replied Mr. Copple.

"Nor do they interrupt other men's conversation," retorted the mayor.

Finally, after further discussion of other phases of the matter, Councilman Copple made a motion that the marshal be instructed to gather evidence against the Atherton woman and to compel her to move from her new location. This was carried.

Previously Councilman Savage wanted to know if she had reformed, saying that the council could do nothing until she had committed some offense in the new quarters.

Wm. Holland, who was present, was called upon by Mayor Straw to tell what he knew about the matter. Mr. Holland admitted that he and Al. Owen owned the house to which the woman was moving and that he had rented it to her. He said he didn't know her, and hadn't seen her but that he had rented it by phone. He said the property had been idle for several years and they had been glad to get a tenant but that he had not been aware that she was an undesirable.

Firemen's Hall.

Fire Chief Traver requested the council to pass a resolution stipulating the firemen should have exclusive charge and control of the room in the city hall which they use for a hall. He said the firemen had gone to considerable expense in fixing it up and that some of the boys kept their uniforms and other articles there. The reason for bringing the question up, he said, was because the other night someone had intimated that the firemen didn't have the authority to exclude anyone from the hall. After more or less discussion, a resolution providing for the firemen to have exclusive charge of the hall until the council decides otherwise was adopted.

Hearing Is Postponed.

In response to a request from C. F. McKnight, the hearing of the local liquor men to protest against the increase of the liquor license from \$600 to \$1,000 per year was postponed until the next meeting. Mr. McKnight represents the liquor men and had to go to Portland Saturday on other matters and could not be present last night.

No Action On Water.

Owing to the failure to receive the plans being prepared by a Portland engineer for a joint waterworks system for North Bend and Marshfield, the committee from the North Bend city council did not put in appearance last night. The Marshfield city council did not take any action on the matter, pending the coming of the North Bend committee.

Other Proceedings.

Contractor Morrissey was ordered paid \$14.61 on his Central avenue contract.

A resolution was adopted authorizing City Treasurer Williams to endorse a warrant given Contractor McLain for the balance due on his old North Broadway contract. There isn't sufficient money in the fund now to pay him and there will not be for a long time owing to the litigation over the ownership of the abutting property and the warrant was ordered issued him so that he would get interest on the account.

Improvement Bond No. 1 for about \$200 which is held by Dr. E. Mingus for the Dredge Committee on the South Broadway improvement was ordered paid.

Councilman Albrecht made a report on the question of paying the telephone company \$5 per month for the special fire alarm service. Mr. Albrecht said that Chief Traver is recommending the adjustment of it had evidently misunderstood the situation. Mr. Albrecht said the arrangement had been made with former manager Durrett and that the company had cut the regular charge from \$6 to \$5 per month. Some one suggested that for the present it be

left the same and others urged that the present arrangement stand for a while. However, it was suggested that the city dispense with the phone in the city engineering office which no one uses and that this \$3 per month be cut off the \$5 per month for the fire alarm.

The question of the Donnelly avenue improvement was brought up. Mr. Albrecht said some of the property owners wanted to be heard before anything further was done about it. Recorder Butler said that there would have to be a deficit assessment when the work was accepted. The reason for the special work on it now was recalled, it having been arranged last year in order to let the bill settle.

The council adjourned until the first Tuesday in May. Councilman Albrecht saying it was unnecessary to meet before that date if the council was not going to make any street improvement this year.

STRIKES AT BILLBOARDS.

Law Forbids Sale of Liquor Advertised on Them.

TACOMA, Wash., April 4.—The municipal commission, in absence of Mayor Fawcett, dealt the billboard a blow by the passage of an ordinance introduced by Commissioner Reys prohibiting the sale or holding for sale of liquors advertised on any billboard in Tacoma. The penalty for violation is loss of license, and any portion of the license fee not used at the time the license is taken away. The ordinance passed unanimously and becomes effective in 10 days.
