Wm. M. Wood, Head of Wool-trust, Relative of Mrs. P. M. Tully.

P. M. Tully and wife are planning a trip to Portland soon for a short visit with Mrs. Tully's uncle, William M. Wood, and his family of Boston, who are now touring the Pacific coast. Mr. Wood and party have been in California for a few weeks and Mr. and Mrs. Tully had hoped to meet them there but were unable to go south and are now planning to meet them in Portland.

Concerning Mr. Wood and his trip, the Los Angeles Times of recent date says:

"William M. Wood of Boston, president of the American Woolen Company, a corporation employing 40,000 persons and having a payroll of more than \$15,000,000 annually, arrived in Los Angeles over the Santa Fe, in his private car, the "Superb."

"With his family, friends and servants he occupies at the Alexandria a veral reserved suites.

ELECTION IN DRAIN.

Bond Issue Carries and Hazard Is Mayor.

DRAIN, Ore., April 6.—At the regular city election held at Drain the citizens voted bonds in the sum of \$20,000. Of this amount \$15,000 will be spent in installing a water system, while the remaining \$5,000 will be expended in laying sewers. It was also voted to prohibit stock running at large within the corporate limits of the town. Among the officers elected to serve during the ensuing year are the following: C. E. Hazard, mayor; Benjamin Huntington, Jr., recorder; R. M. Hedden treasurer; N. D. Cool, Eugene Joalla, Charles Remington and W. M. Moore, councilmen. The election was one of the most interesting held in Drain for years and a large vote was polled.

ELECTION IN EUGENE.

Municipal Ownership Idea Victorious There.

EUGENE, Ore., April 6. — The city election was a Berger victory, the head of the administration ticket winning over W. M. Green by a majority of 54 votes. It was a municipal ownership victory as evidenced by the large majority given the proposition of issuing \$25,000 bonds for a street lighting system.

The personnel of the city council, after the new members are sworn in, will stand as follows: Mayor, F. J. Berger. Councilmen: First ward, Jos DeLay (holdover) and F. R. Wetherbee; second ward, E. Koppe (holdover) and W. J. Warnock; third ward, E. L. Dorr (holdover) and W. A. Bell; fourth ward, S. P. Ness (holdover) and A. N. Striker. All the old members and two of the new ones, besides the new mayor, are all municipal ownership men, and will carry out the work begun by the old council in putting the power plant and water system on a permanent basis.
