ELECTION IN DRAIN.

Bond Issue Carries and Hazard Is Mayor.

DRAIN, Ore., April 6 .- At the regular city election held at Drain the citizens voted bonds in the sum of \$20,000. Of this amount \$15,000 will be spent in installing a water stem, while the remaining \$5,000 will be expended in laying sewers. It was also voted to prohibit stock running at large within the corporate limits of the town. Among the officers elected to serve during the ensuing year are the following: 'C. E. Hazard, mayor; Benjamin Huntington, Jr., recorder; R. M. Hedden treasurer; N. D. Cool, Eugene Joslin, Charles Remington and W. M. Moore, councilmen. The election was one of the most interesting held in Drain for years and a large vote was polled.
