**STREET CASE DECIDED.**

Abutting Property Owner's Right to Dirt Decided.

SALEM, Ore., April 10.—That a property-owner on an abutting street in Portland owns the soil to the middle of the street and that he still owns it when it is excavated unless needed for the improvement of the street and that he has a right to take it away promptly without delaying the work of improvement, are points in a decision by Justice McBride. The decision was handed down by the Supreme Court in the case of the Jonn P. Sharkey Company, respondent, vs. the City of Portland, M. J. Connelley, W. Scott and T. McDougal, appellants.

**FIND DUNCAN'S BODY.**

Missing Curry County Man Finally Found.

The Gold Beach Globe says: "Ben Smith and Billie Wilson, the men hired by the citizens of Gold Beach to hunt for the body of M. W. Duncan, found his body about three-fourths of a mile from the Ben Smith cabin where, at the time, he had been stopping. The body was found to be in exceptional good state of preservation considering the time it had lain there. This was due to the heavy timber in which it was found and until recently must have been covered with snow. The coroner's jury found that M. W. Duncan came to his death by gunshot wound caused by the accidental discharge of his own gun. Duncan was aged about forty-eight.

**KILLED AT COTTAGE GROVE.**

Joseph Liggett, an old time resident of this section, was killed last Monday at Cottage Grove, where he had moved last fall from Marshfield. He was walking to town on the railroad track. In passing the tie plant where the engine was blowing off steam, the whistle of an approaching locomotive was obscured, and Mr. Liggett was struck by the pilot and hurled some seventy-seven feet. His head was crushed to a pulp against a Southern Pacific tool chest. He was 59 years of age.—Myrtle Point Enterprise.
