BREAKWATER GETS WIRELESS.

Aerogram System to Be Installed on Vessel This Month.

When Captain Macgenn, of the steamer Breakwater, inaugurates the summer schedule May 1, after which the vessel will sail for Coos Bay every five days, he will have aboard a feature for which he has longed for more than a year—a complete wireless outfit. C. B. Cooper, chief operator of the United Wireless Telegraph company for the northwest, will have a force in Portland this present month to install a two-kilowatt set, instruments of which have been shipped from Seattle.

On a recent visit to San Francisco C. J. Mills, general manager of the Portland & Coos Bay Steamship company, signed the wireless contract. Other companies will take similar action this season, owing to the enactment of a Federal law last year that provides a penalty for failure to equip vessels operating at sea beyond a certain limit, unless they are fitted with a wireless system. The Breakwater's performance last season gained for her the reputation of being among the most regular steamers plying here, as she reported at the end of each round voyage with the precision of a train and seldom was in the harbor later than 2:30 o'clock the afternoon of the day scheduled for her arrival—Oregonian.
