

## COUNTY CAN'T ISSUE BONDS

No Action On Big Issue for Road Building Can Be Taken Before Election.

"Nothing can be done towards bonding Coos county to raise funds for road improvements until the next general election," remarked John F. Hall, county judge yesterday in discussing the movement started by commercial clubs of the county to bond for \$1,000,000 for the purpose of building good roads. "Attorney General Crawford has ruled that the constitutional amendment does not permit the submitting of the question to a special election, that the county commissioners only have authority to bond up to \$3,000 and that the people at the regular general election only can authorize the issuance of a greater amount of bonds."

This probably will be news to many of the delegates who have been selected to go to Coquille next Friday to confer with the county commissioners and urge the issuance of \$1,000,000 in bonds for road building. It is expected, though, that steps may then be taken for submitting to the voters at the next general election a proposition for bonding the county for a large sum to be used in building permanent roads.

Friday's session of the county commissioners is a special one called for accepting the improvements in the court house but road and other matters will be taken up.

## MANY VISIT BIG STEAMER

Large Lumber Carrier Attracts Much Attention On Coos Bay.

The Hazel Dollar, the big lumber carrier which is taking on a cargo at the Smith mill for China, is attracting many visitors these days. Everyone who can get away is making the trip over to see the big vessel.

The big vessel is of British registry, which enables her to carry a foreign crew and compete with the tramp steamers. Her home port is in British Columbia. She is 384 feet long with a maximum width of 50 feet. Her net tonnage is 3,580 against the Nann Smith's net tonnage of 1,192 and she will carry a cargo of 7,250 tons while the Nann Smith will carry 3,768 tons. When loaded to capacity, the Hazel Dollar draws about 25 feet. The cargo she is now taking on here and which will be completed at Puget Sound is destined for Hong Kong, China. She is taking all dimension stuff as the Chinese import duty is so much per piece, regardless of the size. In consequence, big timbers are taken there and then cut up to save the duty.

Capt. Pentony who is in command of her, is recognized as one of the most careful and skillful navigators on the Pacific. He is highly pleased with Coos Bay after his trip with Capt. B. W. Olson yesterday. He was mate on the Hazel Dollar for

three years and has just been advanced to captain of her. Tomorrow night he and his fellow officers will be guests of honor at a reception at the Millcoma club.
