MILL TO OPEN SOON.
 Rebuilding of Coquille Lumber Mill Nearly Completed.

The Coquille Herald says: "The mill was operated three days last week, during which time they sawed enough lumber to finish repair work about the mill, and also sawed 25 or 30 thousand feet for the new mill. They closed down again the last of the week and are now engaged in putting on the finishing touches preparatory to getting down to business in earnest in a few days. They expect to be running full blast by about the 10th of the month. The conveyors are being finished up and some repair. About 15 men are employed at present, but eight or 10 more will be needed when they get to running steadily."

CURRY COUNTY SHIPPING.
 Port Orford is fast becoming the scene of great shipping activity. Last Friday the steamer Phoenix, running between Bandon & San Francisco, tied up to the wharf and took out a full cargo of shingles and matchwood. The Fifield is expected here on Friday for another shipment of shingles. The Bandon leaves Frisco about the 6th partly loaded for Port Orford.

From now on the Bandon will make Port Orford regularly twice a month with freight from Frisco. The Fifield will call twice a month for freight, shingles and lumber for southern points and will also take passengers.—Port Orford Tribune.
