### Census Enumerator Says All Western Cities of Its Size Were Disappointed.

Editor Times: We agree with The Times in reference to the official census report, when it says, "we can get recount if we go after it in the proper way." Let us not sit back and say "I told you so."

If Marshfield has five thousand, or even four thousand, we are entitled to have those figures go down in the official record instead of two thousand nine hundred and eighty.

If our enumerators failed to give us a true count, through neglect, willfulness or indolence, the law provides a penalty and they ought to be punished. If they failed because of incompetency of course they cannot be punished, since there is no law against ignorance. But in any case if they failed to give us a true count we are entitled to a recount.

Let us get at it at once: First, because the national records will soon be closed against further challenge, and second—, the steamer "Hazel Dollar" is in port, with a large crew and will sail soon.

Let us act and act soon. But if we cannot get a recount, we can console ourselves by remembering that every town in the west, of Marshfield's class, was disappointed to the tune of from one to three thousand.

### COUNT ANGERS PENDLETON.

### Census Total Indicates That City Gains Only 34 In 10 Years.

PENDLETON, Ore., April 12—The receipt of the official census report for Pendleton giving a population of 4460 and showing a gain of 54 persons or exactly 1 per cent in 10 years has aroused a storm of protest and disgust in this city. "Farceful" and "unfair" are a few of the mildest terms applied to the report, but at this late day it is not believed any protest will be made to the department.

It was learned that the 500 bona fide names furnished by the Commercial Association workers after the government census-takers had failed to do their work properly were rejected by the census director. No reason was given for throwing out these names though it is declared there was not a "fake" one in the list.

Chairman Perkins of the board says: "I do not think \$25,000 is too much to ask for a liquor license."
