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STORM SWEEPS FOUR STATES; HEAVY LIFE AND PROPERTY LOSS

Kansas, Oklahoma, Arkansas
and Missouri Suffer
From It.

WIRES DOWN AND
FEW DETAILS GIVEN

Several Small Towns Nearly
Wiped Out by Tornadoes
Yesterday.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

KANSAS CITY, Mo., April 13.—Meager reports received today from the storm stricken districts of Oklahoma, Kansas, Missouri and Arkansas indicated that yesterday's storm covered a wider area than earlier information showed. The number of fatalities is still in doubt as wire service is demoralized and definite news from many points is not obtainable.

When communication with Big Heart, Okla., was established, it was learned that two were killed and sixty injured there. Every business house in the town and two hotels were destroyed. The railway station and school succumbed to the storm's fury.

Whiting, Kas., at first reported a severe sufferer almost escaped injury. The tornado damaged the surrounding farming districts to a considerable extent.

Three are reported killed and several hurt at Delaware, Okla.

Thirty persons were hurt and thirty houses demoralized at Eskridge, Kas.

At Hiawatha, Kan., one was killed and several injured. Twelve buildings were destroyed. At German town and Baker in Kansas considerable damage was done.

Holt, Mo., was greatly damaged. Forty houses were wrecked at Lawrence, Kas., where two were killed and several injured.

MAY CARRY HIS SECRET TO GALLOWS

Mysterious Disappearance of
D. R. Shively In Washington
May Never Be Cleared—
Jahns Silent.

(By Associated Press to the Coos Bay Times.)

SPOKANE, Wash., April 13.—With the hanging of William Frederick Jahns, alias James Logan at the Walla Walla penitentiary, June 21, may vanish the last chance to solve the mysterious disappearance of D. R. Shively, a merchant from Chicago. Four years ago Shively sold a farm near Addy, Wash., to Logan and on receiving the money he vanished. Logan made his home on the farm and engaged Mrs. Agnes Jensen as housekeeper. Later her charred body was found in the ashes of a big camp fire in a lonely part of Stevens county. Logan was tried and convicted of the crime and sentenced to be hanged.

Two weeks ago the burning of a large pile of refuse at a saw mill near Addy exposed a large box carefully buried in the saw dust heap. In the box was the remains of a man. The box tallied with one shipped from Spokane by Logan at the time

Shively disappeared and the size of the body and other details indicated the body is the missing Chicago man.

It is also remembered that before the body was found when Logan was passing the same sawdust pile on his way to the penitentiary, he remarked, "I know where Shively is and can produce him. He is in Alaska."

CONFESSION IS SOUGHT.

Jahns Refuses to Divulge What Became of Logan.

BELLINGHAM, Wash., April 13.—Ever since Jahns was convicted of the murder of his housekeeper, Whatcom county officials have been trying to secure a confession or intimation from him of the whereabouts of the corpse of the real James Logan of Maple Falls whom Jahns is suspected of murdering.

Logan never has been traced and a few months after his death, Jahns who lived at Maple Falls had a deed recorded signed by Logan deeding his farm to Logan who went under the name of Romandorff when he lived at Maple Falls with his wife and son.

PUPILS WILL EXHIBIT WORK

Patrons of Marshfield Public
Schools Invited to Arbor Day
Exercises Tomorrow.

The Arbor Day program at the South Marshfield school tomorrow afternoon, will be given in the general assembly hall. The program consists of class exercises in the main, in which nearly all the children of the grades appear. The hour of the program at this school will be 1:45. Dr. McCormac will be present to give a short talk. After the program, visitors are requested to examine the school work which will be found in the halls and in the various rooms. Visitors are urged to visit room 14 on the second floor to see the work done in Miss Kaufman's department.

At the close of the program, Eric Bolt and Joe Bennett, of the science department will perform some experiments in chemistry for any visitors who may be interested in that work. These experiments will be given in room 9 at 3 o'clock.

The note books in physics, chemistry, botany and zoology will be on exhibition in room 9. Visitors are urged to examine them.

The domestic science classes will have a small display of cookery. Light refreshments will be served.

At the central school, the grades have a large display of drawings in the halls. Other school work has been put up in the respective grade rooms. Visitors are urged to visit the southwest corner room on the second floor and examine the work in sewing done by the pupils of Miss Kaufman's classes. The pupils of this school have some excellent work to show.

There will be a general assembly of the pupils at which the pupils will sing and which Dr. McCormac will address. Program 1 o'clock, grade programs in every room.

All parents are urged to visit the schools Friday. Look up the work of your children. Talk with the teachers about their work. There is absolutely nothing that will do more to tone up the work of the whole school than a yearly exhibit of this kind which parents attend. It gives pupils a definite end to work for. It vitalizes the school work. Come out for the sake of the results at least.

JUDGE LOWE PASSES AWAY

Prominent Pioneer of Coos
County Died in Marshfield
at Age of 87.

Judge David J. Lowe, one of the oldest pioneers of Southwestern Oregon and for years prominently identified with the development of the Coquille valley and Coos county, died today at the home of his daughter, Mrs. A. D. Wolcott, in Marshfield. He had been ailing for some time from a complication of diseases incident to his advanced years. He would have been eighty-eight years old November 10.

Mr. Lowe was born near Baltimore, Md., and joined the gold rush to California in 1849, following service in the Mexican war under General Taylor. In 1856, he came to Oregon, Chas. Hillborn, the Millicoma pioneer, being a member of the party. Later he located at Port Orford and ran a hotel there for a while and finally in 1858 located on the Coquille river where he made his home until about three years ago when he and his wife came to Marshfield to reside with their daughter Mrs. Wolcott.

Mr. Lowe served four terms as justice of the peace on the Coquille, was school clerk of the Myrtle Grove district which he had organized because the nearest school was then at Bandon for twenty-one years, county commissioner three terms and county judge one term.

Judge Lowe is survived by his wife, formerly Miss Eulalie A. Slayback of Illinois, whom he married September 13, 1857. Three children also survive. They are Frank L. Lowe and Mrs. A. D. Wolcott of Marshfield and David Lowe of Coquille.

The body will be taken to Coquille for burial, the funeral services being conducted there at 11 o'clock Saturday morning. Bandon Post No. 56, G. A. R., will have charge of the services.

FAVORABLE REPORT ON BILL FOR CANADIAN RECIPROCITY

TO LET PEOPLE
CHOOSE MEN

Measure Providing for Popular
Election of Senators Will
Pass House.

POPULAR ELECTION BILL.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 13.—The passage of a resolution for the direct election of senators with many republicans voting in favor of it probably will be accomplished in the House today before the end of today's session.

The discussion, it is believed, will not be prolonged and the democratic leaders expect the bill will be rushed through among the first of the party measures.

LIABILITIES ARE LARGE

President of Carnegie Trust Co.
Proves Worthy High Fi-
nancier.

NEW YORK, N. Y., April 13.—An involuntary petition in bankruptcy was filed here today against William J. Cummings, president of the failed Carnegie Trust Company and now under indictment. Liabilities are given at five million assets four hundred thousand. Payson Merrill was appointed receiver with a bond of one hundred thousand dollars.

Two other petitions in bankruptcy were filed against Charles Arthur Moore, Jr., director of the Carnegie Trust Company, and Martin J. Condon also a director. The liabilities of Moore are given at two million with assets of hundred thousand and of Condon liabilities \$500,000, assets \$500,000.

Takes Quick Action of
Measure Today.

FREE LIST BILL

TAKEN UP NEXT

Democrats Favor It and Repub-
licans Oppose—What
Congress Is Doing.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 13.—The Canadian reciprocity bill introduced in the House yesterday was reported favorably to the House today by the new Ways and Means Committee. The committee also passed favorably on the free list measure but will not report it until tomorrow.

The Canadian reciprocity bill was taken up first by the committee and after a brief discussion McCall, its sponsor in the 61st Congress moved it be approved.

This was done without division. The free list bill, however, was not unanimously approved, the vote on it in the committee being strictly a party vote, the democrats favoring it. The republicans said it was ill-advised and not supported by sufficient data to indicate accurately its effect if adopted.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 12.—"We expect to call up the reciprocity bill Friday," said Chairman Underwood of the Ways and Means Committee, "and we will seek to pass it as soon as possible. Then will come the free list bill and following that the bill providing for statehood for Arizona and New Mexico. Reapportionment will come later."

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 12.—Uncertainty exists as to what course will be pursued by the Senate with reference to the Canadian reciprocity bill when it reaches that body, possibly next week. Senator Penrose, who will become new chairman of the Committee on Finance is friendly to the bill and will urge favorable action. Friends of the bill will also make a decided gain in the absence of Senator Hale from the committee, he not only opposed the measure in the committee but obstructed it in the Senate. Senator Bailey is expected to make an effort to have the bill, which he opposes, amended.

With the bill once before the Senate a fairly long contest is expected. It is generally believed, however, that it will pass.

BOLD BANDIT ROBS TRAIN

Holds Up Conductor and Bra-
keman and Wounds Former
When He Resists.

SYRACUSE, Kan., April 13.—An unknown man boarded the Santa Fe passenger train as it left here at one o'clock today. He was heavily armed and pointed a revolver at Conductor B. Kelley and brakeman O'Leary whom he robbed of a small sum. When he attempted to rob the passengers, Kelley made a show of resistance and was shot twice through the shoulder by the bandit. The man then stopped the train and dropped off. A posse is searching for him. Kelley will probably be recovered.
