## FLIES FROM LONDON TO PARIS

### New French Aviator Scores Triumph In Long Distance Flight.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

LONDON, England, April 12.—Pierre Prior, an aviator started an aeroplane from Hendon today in an attempted flight to Paris without a stop. The airman successfully crossed the English channel between Dover and Calais and continued his flight toward the French capital.

Issy-les-Moulineaux, France, April 12.—Prior arrived here at 5:45 this evening from London, 290 miles in a monoplane without stopping.

Prior is a newcomer in international aviation and his flight to the suburbs of Paris today places him in the ranks of the foremost world's aviators. The best previous cross-country flight was 147 miles made by Lieutenant Cameroun who made a distance in four hours and twenty minutes, December 22 last in France.

### SAN FRANCISCO MAN RESIGNS.

#### Commissioner of Immigration Quits Place Under Pressure.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 12.—The announcement is made here that H. H. North, Commissioner of Immigration in San Francisco has resigned. No reasons are given and no successor decided upon.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 12.—Owing to charges of laxity in his office especially in regard to the admission of Hindu and other immigrants from the Orient, Hart H. North, commissioner of immigration of this port, was suspended several months ago pending an investigation which it is understood has been in progress for some time. In the mean time, the office has been in charge of Rufus S. Steward, as acting commissioner.

### CHAMPAGNE RIOTS SERIOUS.

#### Seven Thousand Wine Growers Participate In Demonstration Destroying Property.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

DAMERY, Department of Marne, France, April 12.—The champagne riots which began in this department yesterday were continued this morning by the excited populace. Wine cellars are being destroyed and the disorder is spreading in spite of the presence of troops called out to preserve order. The trouble began yesterday on receipt of news from Paris

that the Senate had passed a resolution in favor of the suppression of all territorial definitions of the area in which wine can legally be designated champagne. Seven thousand wine growers left here today marching on the Epernay, four miles distant to destroy wine cellars there. The manifests were admirably organized and during the progress of the march they sang revolutionary songs and waved red flags. They claim the action of the government will ruin them as the action will aid the makers of inferior grades of wine. Damery is today a picture of desolation. The streets were literally demolished by the mob last night.

EPERNAY, Champagne, April 12.—An important division of the wine rioters succeeded in avoiding the troops and reached this place and sacked several depots of Champagne. The troopers charged with drawn sabres and several were wounded.

### FOUR INJURED IN WRECK.

#### Everett Freight Car Collides With Trolley at Crossing.

SEATTLE, Wash., April 12.—An Everett interurban freight car struck a trolley car at the crossing in Ballard at noon and hurled the car one hundred feet and seriously injured four passengers who were taken to hospitals. The leg of one woman was almost severed.

### ALASKA TOWN DESTROYED.

#### Center of New Gold Fields Wiped Out By Fire.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

SEATTLE, Wash., April 12.—A cable to The Times from Kaltan, Alaska, says, "Practically all of the business section of Iditarod City was laid in ruins by a fire last Tuesday. The shops of business of more than twenty concerns were destroyed. The estimated loss is one hundred thousand dollars. So far as known none of the places burned were insured. The fire broke out in the Pioneer hotel owned by Mrs. Donaldson, shortly after noon, and spread slowly but irresistibly, the fire fighting equipment being crude and the water-supply coming from a remote mud-hole."

### CITY GETS FREE PHONES.

SPRINGFIELD, Ore., April 13.—The Springfield Council granted the Pacific States Telephone & Telegraph company a franchise to operate lines in Springfield. The franchise gives the company the use of all streets and alleys for poles. The city gets the use of five phones free and the present ten-party lines must be changed so that no more than four parties will be on the same line.
