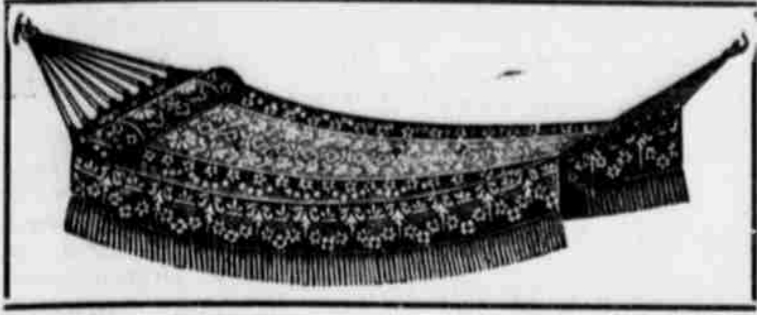

THE RECALL AND THE JUDICIARY

Judge Watkins States Some Cogent Reasons of Approval.

Editor Times: It is alleged that Theodore Roosevelt approves the Oregon plan—except he thinks the recall should not apply to the judiciary. The writer has the greatest respect for T. R. and would be delighted to see him made president again, yet he does not think that T. R. is infallible. Mr. Roosevelt does not, so far as I know, state why he thinks the recall should not apply to the judiciary—he does not give us the reasons for his opinion—he merely states the ultimate fact and leaves up to furnish the reasons therefor.

Proceeding then along these lines it occurs to me that the most logical reason supporting the view of Mr. Roosevelt would be that the recall might have a tendency to deter a timid judge from performing the functions of his office fairly and impartially—that he might be inclined to listen to and be controlled by public opinion to the detriment of litigants.

The trouble with this sort of argument, from the standpoint of T. R. is, that it is illogical. If the recall is not good in one case, it is not good in any case it is either good or bad, it can't be half good and half bad.

If the recall should have a tendency to frighten limber kneed and truculent judges and induce them to perform their duties in an erroneous manner, or not at all, then the same influence might, and probably would have the same effect on all other officers of the same spineless proclivities, whether their duties were judicial or not.

Admit then that a timid, corrupt or spineless official, a "good feller," is certain to be controlled by some influence whether it be fear, pelf or friendship, then why is it not probable that a wholesome fear of the recall would be more to the interest of all the people than the influence of organized plunder? If we have any officials who are so pusillanimous that they can't perform the duties of their office without fear, favor or hope of reward, then it occurs to me that it is better that such official should be under the control of the power that put them in office than under the control of any other influence.

If the recall will never work any greater hardship than to keep official molly-coddles in fear of the people, let us never, never forsake it. It is a priceless discovery.
