The cannerly building is now complete and the prospects are for a most successful season for it.

BOY KILLS PANTHERS. Curry County Lad Slays Two Big Ones.

The Gold Beach Globe says: "There are not many boys who have as much nerve as Ellis Miller, the 15-year-old son of E. R. Miller of Lobster Hill. A few days ago, Ellis was sent by his father to look after some stock on the range. Not having far to go, he took only his rifle, thinking it was not worth while to take the dogs. When returning from the errand, he was startled by a ferocious and hideous growling only a few feet away. He recognized the screeching as that of a panther, but could see nothing but the shaking of the bushes, which indicated that he was retreating. Realizing how important it was to his father's flock to have the big cat killed and being farther inspired by the \$10 bounty, Ellis took after him hollering and making as much noise as he could, in hopes of chasing him through an opening and getting a shot at him. Doubtless the panther thought that about 15 thousand boys climbed a large tree. With one well directed shot, Ellis brought the brute to the ground. He proudly bore his trophy home, reaching there soon after dark. Early the next morning he returned to the place with the dogs and killed another one that was almost as large as a yearling calf."
