WAR ON HOUSE FLY.

Portland Authorities Will Try to Exterminate Pest.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 19.—Health officers are going to make Portland a flyless town this summer. They promise these disease breeders will be rare indeed and that the fly pest of former summers will be almost wholly abated. The system of flushing the downtown pavements every night, instead of sweeping them as formerly, washes the larva of the flies into the sewers, thus doing away with one of the most favorable breeding places.

Every road leading into Portland will be oiled this summer to lay the dust and this treatment completely kills flies and renders their eggs harmless. The oil applied is crude petroleum which contains a small quantity of carbolic acid, and is sure death to flies and mosquitoes.

Dr. Calvin S. White, state health officer, is very active in his warfare on flies. "There remains one dangerous source of fly production," said he, "and that is unscrubbed food. I would advise every housewife not to buy any article of food from any store that does not use screens. All the food exhibited in markets and elsewhere should be kept screened from flies. Unless these pests have breeding places, they will not bother us and public health will be protected tremendously."

Dr. White has considered the plan to have the City Council pass an anti-fly ordinance but he believes the education of the public along the line of leaving no breeding places for the pestiferous fly is more important.

Stereoptican slides, showing the dangers to be feared from flies, the best means of destroying them, and preventing them from getting established in the house, will be shown by Dr. White both in the city schools and in public gatherings about the city. A lecture will accompany the pictures, giving instructions how to swat the flies.

HAVE NEW PLAN.

Board of Army Engineers On Harbor Improvements.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 19.—The Board of Army Engineers, after mature consideration of the many complicated questions involved, and with the view of causing harbor facilities to be increased as rapidly as they are going to be needed, has made some important recommendations of interest to the people of Oregon, and announces the following uniform rules as the guiding policy of the board in making all harbor improvements hereafter:

That the advisability or inadvisability of the government's undertaking any work at any harbor be determined in the manner now established by existing law and practice.

That no work of construction or maintenance be undertaken by the government at any harbor constructed by and operated in the interest of a corporation or private person and adapted to the promotion of such interest only.

That the work of the government at any harbor be confined to the general part of the harbor, including, as may be necessary, the construction and maintenance of breakwaters with the general anchorage area protected thereby, of entrance piers and jetties at the mouths of inner channels, and the portion of such channels immediately between them, and also of such long general channels of approach as may be necessary to connect the harbor with the outside deep water.

The board recommends that harbors in which the whole or a part is improved at local expense should not be undertaken or maintained by the general government.

BOYS AS GARDENERS.

Portland Back Yards Converted to Valuable Use.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 19.—Portland school boys are turning their attention to vegetable gardening quite generally as the result of the contest started by the local Y. M. C. A. Final enrollments have been made and 331 back-lot gardens have been planted. 283 contestants have elected to grow early vegetables and 48 will care for late gardens.

The plots planted by the youngsters run from 150 to 300 square feet in size and the total of vegetables raised will be enough to supply 1,000 persons throughout the entire season.

Schools of the city are represented by pupils who are contesting for a school trophy in addition to the individual prizes. In all, 43 schools are represented. Woodlawn leading with 30 entries and Lents coming second with 22.

Each of the boys in the contest will submit a monthly report of his gardening operations and from these reports, the inspection of the gardens by an expert and the final showing of the vegetables, awards will be made. The early vegetable growing contest will close late in May.
