Portland Back Yards Converted to Valuable Use.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 19-Portland school boys are turning their attention to vegetable gardening quite generally as the result of the contest started by the local Y. M. C. A. Final enrollments have been made and 331 back-lot gardens have been planted. 283 contestants have elected to grow early vegetables and 48 will care for

The plots planted by the youngsters run from 150 to 300 square feet in size and the total of vegetables raised will be enough to supply 1,000 persons throughout the en-

Schools of the city are represented by pupils who are contesting for a school trophy in addition to the individual prizes. In all, 43 schools are represented. Woodlawn leading with 30 entries and Lents coming second

Each of the boys in the contest will submit a monthly report of his gardening operations and from these reports, the inspection of the gardens by an expert and the final showing of the vegetables, awards will be made. The early vegetable growing contest will close late in May.
