CAPT. H. R. REED left this week for Stockton, Cal., where he will take a position in charge of the construction and repair of the California Navigation and Improvement company's vessels.

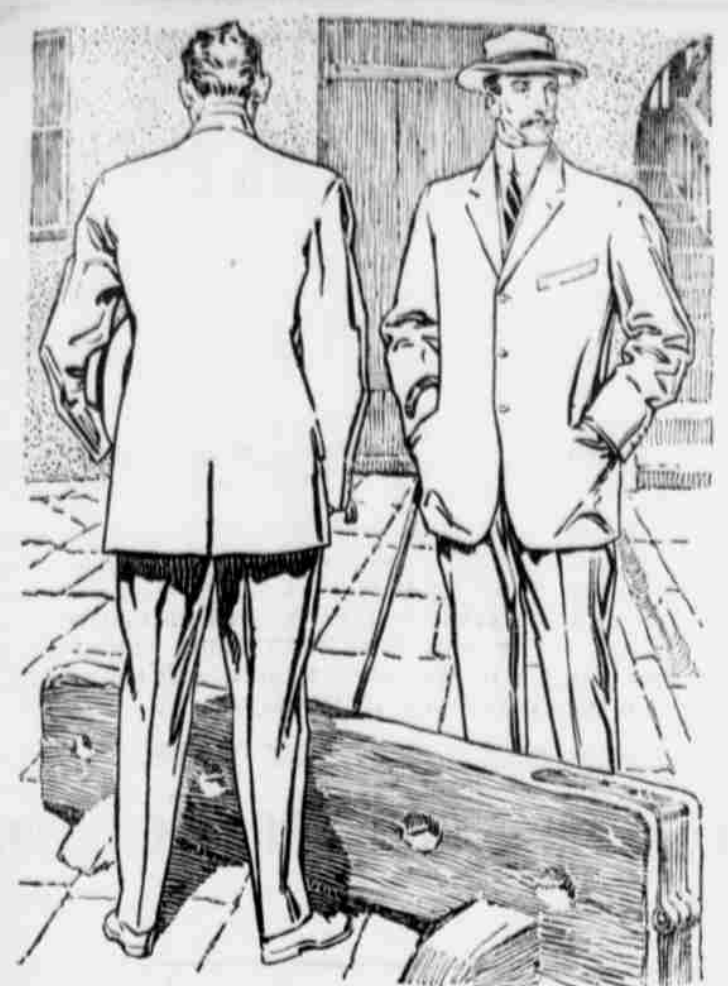

CALLS HIGH SCHOOLS FAILURES.

Kansas Educator Declares They Are Increasing Class Distinction In United States.

TOPEKA, Kas., April 21.—The high schools of Kansas and the country are doing more to increase class distinction in the United States than in making men and women who are worth while, according to E. T. Fairchild, state superintendent of public instruction. The lack of vocational training in the high schools is responsible for this, in Mr. Fairchild's opinion. There is too much culture and too little of the training that tends to make boys and girls appreciate the dignity of labor.
