MADERO AGREES TO ARMISTICE TO END MEXICAN REVOLUTION

Rebel Leader Will Delay Contemplated Attack On Juarez Awhile.

PEACE IN SIGHT AS RESULT OF IT

Expect President Diaz Will Unofficially Agree to the Pact.

EL PASO, Tex., April 22.—General Madero has agreed to delay his contemplated attack on Juarez pending peace negotiations providing the government will on its part bind itself to move no troops particularly in the direction of Juarez.

EXPECT DIAZ TO AGREE. May Not Officially Recognize Rebels By Armistice, Though.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 22.—Dr. Vasquez, confidential agent of the Mexican revolutionists in the United States, received today a telegram from General Francisco L. Madero, Jr., authorizing him to begin negotiations with the Mexican government for an immediate armistice.

The news of the agreement to arrange an armistice was immediately telegraphed by Gomez to Senor De Labarra, minister of Foreign Affairs at Mexico City. The belief is general here that Mexico will quietly agree to the armistice although the action by that government may be taken "unofficially" in order to avoid public recognition of the insurgents.

PLEASES PRESIDENT TAFT. Believe Armistice Will Relieve An Embarrassing Tangle.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 22.—President Taft received the news of the arrangement for an armistice with undisguised satisfaction. He was quick to inform the members of the cabinet and summoned Secretary Dickinson for a short conference.

SHOE MAKER IS FOUND SLAIN

L. M. Hughes of Seattle Killed and Robbed in Southern Part of City.

SEATTLE, Wash., April 22.—L. M. Hughes, a shoemaker, aged fifty, was shot in the neck and killed last night and his pockets rifled in the southern part of the city. The body was found under a bridge and at first it was thought to be suicide but investigation revealed robbery was the motive.

TO GIVE DIAZ TIME TO QUIT

Madero Will Not Insist On Immediate Retirement of President.

MADEROS CAMP (via El Paso, Tex., April 22.—The prospects for peace in Mexico became rosier today when General Madero in an interview with the Associated Press correspondent declared he had never and does not now insist upon the immediate resignation of President Diaz as a necessary preliminary to signing a peace pact.

Madero denied he had ever sent an ultimatum to Diaz insisting that he resign. He said he would like to see the revolution ended peacefully and wanted no more bloodshed.

"I have always been willing to make concessions to bring the war to an end and there is no personal sacrifice I would not make. It must be borne in mind, however, that there can be no peace the terms of which are not satisfactory to the Mexican people."

With reference to the Gomez announcement of an armistice being arranged, Madero said, "I telegraphed to Dr. Gomez that if the armistice is to be arranged it should be for four or five days and should include the entire region between Juarez and Chihuahua. We are waiting for a reply to this from Mexico City. We outnumber the garrison of Juarez two to one and cannot relinquish this advantage without assurance that the government will not attempt to send reinforcements. If the government sincerely wishes peace on a basis of justice as much as we do, then there can be no doubt we can come to terms."

EXPLOSION OF GASOLINE IS FATAL

Three Killed Outright and Nine Others Injured, Four Fatally, in St. Louis Today.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., April 22.—The explosion of a tank car filled with gasoline here today killed three persons and injured nine others, four

of them perhaps fatally. The car was standing on the Wabash tracks at the plant of the Beloit company. Four of the injured at the hospital according attendants cannot live. Three small buildings were set on fire and partly destroyed. The dead are Mrs. Agnes Dallwitz, her grand daughter Emma Dallwitz and Edwin Hauk, a Wabash fireman, who were standing near the car.

FEDERALS TO MARCH NORTH

Mexican Troops Prepare for Conflicts With Rebels at Several Points.

CHIHUAHUA, Mex., April 22.—Preparations for a fight with the insurgents proceed here today apparently without any prospect of peace. General Rabago's column of cavalry which had started to engage the rebels at Ojinaga was hurriedly recalled and he with General Diaz and one thousand men were ordered to proceed to the United States border presumably at Juarez. It is the purpose of the Federals to wedge in between the border and the insurgents' forces and if possible drive them back into the interior out of the way of possible international complications.

BLIND HORSE PLUGS WINDOW

Kicks Out Plate Glass In New York Jewelry and Scatters Diamonds In Street.

NEW YORK, N. Y., April 22.—A blind horse kicked his way through two big plate glass windows of a jewelry store and sent \$200,000 worth of diamonds from the window into the street. The policeman stationed at this point, one of the busiest corners in the city of New York, had all they could do to control the crowds while proprietors and clerks of the jewelry establishment picked up the gems. An inventory will be necessary before it will be known whether anybody got away with any of the diamonds.

LONGER DELAY AT PORTAND

THREE DROWN IN 'FRISCO BAY

Men Attempting to Desert Whaling Ship In Harbor Lose Lives.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 22.—While attempting to escape from the steam whaler Belvedere scheduled to sail for Alaska waters today, Rowell Holder and G. M. Hogan who signed for the cruise were drowned in the bay last night. Joseph Gordon, a third member of the crew engaged in an effort to rescue the men and lost his life when one of the Belvedere boats was lost from the davits. The small boat in which Holder and Hogan attempted to escape was not fitted with a plug and it filled with water and the men drowned before the rescue boat could reach them.

GROOM HARMON FOR PRESIDENT

Ohio Democrats Decide to Start Campaign For Him For 1912.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 22.—The Ohio democratic delegation in congress after scanning the political horizon has decided to "shuck" coats and go to work in earnest for Governor Judson Harmon as their candidate for the presidential nomination in 1912.

That Harmon will have formidable rivals is conceded by those attending the conference and the names of Bryan, Champ Clark and Governor Wilson of New Jersey were mentioned as the possible opponents.

PLUMBING at MILNER'S.

House Passes Measure and Congress Takes Rest For a Day.

SENATE ROW WILL DELAY THE MEASURE

"Free List" to Be Taken Up In House While Senate Considers.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 22.—Both branches of congress rested today. Following the passage yesterday by the House of the Canadian Reciprocity bill that body is expected to take up the "farmers free list" which has been brought in to offset some of the dissatisfaction the farmers feel because of Canadian reciprocity putting on them, as they believe, most of the burdens of the expected freer trade relations with Canada.

When the Canadian bill reaches the Senate Monday it will be plunged into an unorganized body of the committee vacancies that have not been filled because of a split between the regular and insurgent factions over the refusal of the minority to accept the insurgents as a district organization. This promises a further delay in the announcement of committee. It probably will be two or three weeks before the Canadian reciprocity bill emerges from the finance committee.
