QUARANTINE ORCHARDS.

Diseased orchards ought to be quarantined the same as people having contagious ailments, according to some of the leading fruit growers of the northwest. The propaganda is making headway, particularly in the Yakima Valley, where Dr. J. G. Speicher has come to the conclusion that there is a great similarity in the disease of plants and animals. He advocates quarantining orchards infected with woolly aphids and blight. Like consumption and cancer in the human, these plant ills defy treatment. The only way to handle such orchards is to uproot the trees with woolly aphids and destroy them, while blight infected branches should be cut out and burned. Prevention and eradication is the only effective way of handling.
