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THREE DYNAMITE SUSPECTS TO REACH LOS ANGELES TODAY

Display Strange Moods When Reporters Meet Them On the Train.

ONE OF PRISONERS THREATENS INTERVIEWERS

Detective In Charge of Them Claims One of Them Has Confessed.

VICTORVILLE, Cal., April 26.—(On board Santa Fe train)—With the end of their journey to the Los Angeles jail almost in sight, the three prisoners en route from the East are affected by vastly different degrees by the prospect of the desperate legal struggle for their lives.

John J. McNamara, the indicted secretary and treasurer of the International Bridge and Structural Iron Workers courteously invited the callers to enter the compartment. "You come to see what a big villain I am, I presume," he said.

Ortie McNamigal, the alleged tool of the dynamiters' ring, was in the lightest humor of them all. "I'm holding a pat hand," he said gaily.

None of the men have been out of their separate compartments since they left the starting place. In the day time, they were only shackled but at night while asleep are shackled and handcuffed to the guards.

Flammer declared that one of the men had confessed fully to all the plots that had been carried out.

READY FOR TRIAL. District Attorney Prepared For Arraignment.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 26.—The district attorney's office is in complete readiness, it is stated, to proceed with the arraignment and trial of the accused men. Several witnesses from San Francisco are in the city to identify if possible James J. McNamara as the James Bryce whom they knew in that city and alleged to be one of the purchasers of the dynamite with which the Los Angeles explosions are alleged to have been accomplished.

BUTTE MINERS HELP. Promise to Lend Aid to Accused Union Officials.

BUTTE, Mont., April 26.—Butte Miners Union No. 1 of the Western Federation of Miners, the largest local in the United States, passed resolutions at a meeting here last night pledging the moral and financial and "if needed, the physical support" to the men charged with complicity in the dynamiting outrages in Los Angeles and calling upon Congressman Victor Berger of Milwaukee to press an inquiry by the National House and Senate.

BURNS REFUSES TO TELL TALE

Detective In Dynamite Cases Will Not Testify Before Grand Jury.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., April 26.—The Marion county grand jury today continued its probe in the so-called "dynamite" conspiracy. This involves on one hand charges that Indianapolis was the seat of the alleged conspiracy by the dynamiters who in two years are said to have caused more than one hundred explosions directed against employers of and sympathizers with non-union workmen and on other hand charges that enemies of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers have attempted by "planting" dynamite in its office building, to convict it and its secretary J. J. McNamara of the dynamite outrages.

REPUBLICAN SPLIT GROWS SERIOUS

Progressive Republicans' Demands Refused By Stand-patters and Party May Lose Power In Senate.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 26.—The split in the Republican ranks which threatens the Republican supremacy in the Senate assumed grave proportions today when the regular Republicans flatly refused to meet three demands of progressives.

SELLS STOCK IN PROJECT

General Plan of J. M. Blake's Street Car Proposition Is Outlined.

Although Jacob M. Blake, who is promoting a street car line in Marshfield has not made a public statement of the plans of his project, he has stated to various ones of whom he is soliciting subscriptions for stock.

His plan is said to put in a line at the lowest possible cost at present by using storage battery cars. He proposes to put on two cars at the start. These storage battery cars will not require any overhead wires or the bonding of the rail joints as is usual on electric street car lines.

The company is to be capitalized at \$100,000 of which \$50,000 is to be preferred stock and \$50,000 common stock. He sells the preferred stock at eighty-six cents on the dollar now and with each share of preferred he gives a share of common stock for nothing as a bonus.

On this basis, \$57,000 out of the \$100,000 will be what is known as "watered stock."

It is understood that J. W. Bennett and J. H. Flanagan have agreed to take \$5,000 of the bonds of his company and C. A. Smith \$5,000 of the bonds when he gets the stock subscribed.

Mr. Blake has not yet made any statement about commencing construction of the road but he expects to announce the directors and officials of the company soon.

His franchise requires that he must have a mile of line completed and in operation by July 1, but owing to the delays in getting stock subscriptions and other reasons, he has given certain parties of whom he has solicited stock subscriptions that he will ask another extension of time.

AUTO BANDITS ROB JEWELRY

Four Armed Robbers With a Limousine Get \$15,000 In Chicago.

CHICAGO, Ill., April 26.—Four armed robbers, who had a limousine automobile entered the jewelry store of Edward Alberti, 1246 Milwaukee avenue, today and beat the proprietor and clerk helpless and escaped with plunder valued at \$15,000.

Alberti and his clerk were left tied in chairs in the rear room of the store. The jeweler's son and two other persons were also beaten by the robbers. The auto in which the robbers escaped was stolen by them in a distant part of the city.

MORE GOSSIP OF RAILROAD

Report That Contract Has Been Let for 130 Miles From Eugene Here.

The first railroad rumor of importance in several days reached here yesterday in the shape of a quotation from The Contractor, a Kansas City publication, that a Kansas City firm had been awarded the contract for building 130 miles of road from Eugene to Coos Bay. No further particulars were given and there is a disposition to question its accuracy unless something has been secretly pulled off in the railroad world and a new company is behind the project.

However, there is another story that partly substantiates it and that is that the Southern Pacific has chosen the Eugene route to build to Coos Bay when it does construct a line. A few weeks ago an apparently authentic report reached here that the Southern Pacific had decided to retain the Drain route as against the Eugene route. However, later reports indicate this was erroneous. It is stated on almost unquestioned authority that the Eugene route has been approved by Chief Engineer Hood and his recommendations for that route have been forwarded to the New York officials of the company. This recommendation went forward about three weeks ago so that it is up to the directors for an appropriation for its construction but this appropriation is not expected before the July budget is announced.

Further confirmation of the selection of the Eugene route reached here yesterday when Joe Schilling who came down Gardiner, stated that he had been reliably informed that men had been sent to Drain for the removal of the last of the supplies laid in there when the road was first started.

COUPLE SLAIN AND CREMATED

Evidence of Crime Found In Charred Ruins of Home Near Arcola, Ill.

DR. HYDE IS OUT ON BAIL

Alleged Murderer of Col. Swope Granted Freedom By Kansas City Judges

KANSAS CITY, Mo., April 26.—Dr. B. C. Hyde, under life sentence for the murder of Colonel Thomas H. Swope, was released from the county jail today on a writ of habeas corpus granted by the seven judges of the circuit court here.

In the opinion of the court on banc, a majority of the evidence upon which the physician convicted was circumstantial and there is reasonable doubt of his guilt. Hyde's bail was set at \$50,000.

Bernard Smyth, 18 Years Old, Escapes When Captor Is Chloroformed.

CAPTORS PLANNED TO GET GIRL COMPANION

Son of Former Attorney General Relates Wonderful Story On Return.

OMAHA, Neb., April 26.—Dazed from chloroform, Bernard Smyth, 17 years old, walked into his home early today with a remarkable story of his escape from kidnapers. In fulfillment of many black mailing letters demanding high ransom from the boy's father, C. J. Smyth, former attorney general, two masked men seized the youth early in the evening while he was walking from a tennis club, bound and gagged the victim, threw him into a closed carriage and took him to a deserted shack in the suburbs. According to young Smyth's statement one of the men departed saying he was going to get Frances Hostetter, a 16 year old girl chum of Smyth, who also had been threatened. The remaining kidnaper was overcome by the fumes of the chloroform he was administering to the captive.

At this juncture the delinquent boarded a street car for home. He is in a serious condition from nervous fright and stupor.

The affair is the climax of a mystery which has alarmed the city for three weeks. Letters demanding \$2,000 on the threat of kidnaping the boy and girl have been persistent. Up to Sunday, detectives guarded both of the threatened families.

SIAMESE TWIN FREAK OUTDONE

Remains of Indian Body With Two Heads, Four Arms And Legs Found.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., April 26.—The body of an Indian boy with two heads and four arms and four legs was discovered in a cave near Okmulgee, Okla., yesterday by Emmons Lowe, a farmer boy hunting rabbits. The body was nearly five feet tall. The flesh on bones had dried and apparently there has been no decay. Old residents in the vicinity of the monstrosity found remembrance such an Indian boy who has been missing ten years. He was kept out of sight by other members of the tribe and it is supposed he wandered away and died in a cave. Person who remembered the freak declare he walked, and talked as if not different from a normal human being. The monstrosity in reality was two persons in one body, even the shoulder each being separate and perfect. The body was very wide and the lower limbs perfectly developed. The bodies were joined together below the shoulders and from there down to the hips.
