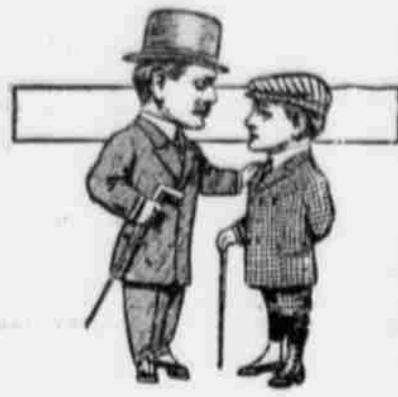

CAUCUS IN COQUILLE.

Candidates for City Offices Are Nominated.

The Coquille Sentinel says: The city caucus was held at the Masonic hall as per the call of the city recorder.

Ten candidates were named for the one-year term and the vote resulted in the choice of W. C. Laird, W. A. Mansell and Al. Crouch.

Nominations were then declared open for the two-year term. The vote resulted in the choice of F. C. True, Fred Von Pegert and A. W. Johnson.

Nominations were then called for the office of city recorder. For this office several were nominated, all declining except A. W. Kelly, the present incumbent, and J. S. Lawrence. The vote resulted in the nomination of J. S. Lawrence.

It was moved and seconded and carried that a committee of three be appointed for the purpose of filling any vacancies on the ticket which might occur prior to election day. The chair named O. C. Sanford, T. T. Land and B. H. Burns.

All of the candidates nominated by the caucus have accepted the nominations except Fred Von Pegert, who declined to serve. His place on the ticket has been filed by the committee by placing the name of Charles Skeels in the place of that of Mr. Von Pegert.

LANDO'S WELL WATER.

Says He Is Surprised That Chemist Found It to Be Impure.

Editor Times: Replying to the item in The Times of the 25th, regarding my well on "Telegraph" not "Knob" Hill from which the sample was taken, would say it is located at a point above any residence, and at the foot of the steep hill which extends some three hundred feet higher than where the well is located. Nobody lives on this hill and even if they did the water would have to seep through an immense quantity of clay before it would be possible to reach the well. The well is 25 feet deep, and the bottom is lined with brick for a distance of five feet, and from there up the well is lined with concrete so that no surface water can get in, and every drop of water which gets into the well has to seep through the bricks. A short time before the sample was taken the well was emptied for the purpose of cleaning it, but there was nothing to clean. There is a spring at the foot of the hill where this water is located and it has always been considered the purest water in town coming from the hill above the
