**ASSAULT CASE HEARD TODAY**

**George Noah Fined \$20 and Costs For Hitting C. L. Brainard.**

George Noah of Noah's logging camp, twelve miles above Allegany, pleaded guilty to a charge of assault and battery in Justice Pennock's court today and was fined \$20 and costs. The charges were preferred by C. L. Brainard, another employe of the camp.

Brainard charged that he and Noah had some differences. Later when he was measuring up some logs that Noah sent him an awful jolt on the side of the head. He was knocked into the water and was in danger of drowning. Finally he started to swim back to the raft and Noah, he claimed, threatened to hit him again and he had to swim to the other shore.

Noah paid his fine with the remark that it was worth the money to get a good lick at Brainard.

**IS WOMAN'S FACE HER OWN?**

**Supreme Court of United States Is Trying to Solve This \$1,000 Problem.**

HASHINGTON, D. C., May 3. — Members of the Supreme Court of the United States have put their heads together to determine whether a pretty woman may prevent the use of her photograph for advertising purposes.

The court was considering the case of Mrs. Aida T. Rhodes of Brooklyn, N. Y. She had her photograph taken for a present for her husband.

Mrs. Rhodes obtained from the company exhibiting her photograph a \$1,000 judgment. Now the Supreme court is asked to annul as unconstitutional the New York statute of 1903, making it a misdemeanor to use a name or photograph for advertising or trade purposes without the consent of the subject.

**GAUZE IN BODY SEVEN YEARS.**

**Former Patient Brings Suit Against Chicago Doctor, Who Performed Old Operation, for \$50,000**

CHICAGO, Ill., May 3. — For seven years George E. Montgomery of Florida says he carried a strip of surgeon's gauze in his abdomen. He asserts it was left there by Dr. Charles E. Kahlke of the Hahnemann hospital, who operated on him on September 26, 1903. Recently he filed suit against the surgeon in the United States District court to recover \$50,000 damages.

**WILL DISCUSS ROAD TONIGHT**

**Marshfield Chamber of Commerce to Hold Special Meeting for Purpose.**

A meeting will be held at the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce this evening to take up the matter of improving the old Coos Bay wagon road. A general invitation has been extended to business men and citizens in general to be present and formulate plans for laying the matter forcibly before the Coos county commissioners at Coquille tomorrow. It is planned to have a big delegation go from here there.

It is understood that there is a move on foot to have Coos county center its efforts in improving the Myrtle Point-Roseburg road with a view to having the Douglas county commissioners do the same thing, the latter having recently informed Commissioner Dement that as long as Coos county insists on keeping up two or three roads to Roseburg, the Douglas commissioners are not able to improve any of them to the extent desired.

**PROVIDE FOR SAFE FOURTH**

**Sale and Use of Explosives Regulated by Council—Other Matters.**

The discharge of toy cannons, loaded anvils, firecrackers more than four inches long and one inch in diameter, fireworks and other similar explosives inside the city limits of Marshfield is forbidden by an ordinance adopted by the city council last night. Furthermore, dealers are prohibited from selling any of the forbidden noise-makers, the same penalty being provided for their sale as for their use.

The ordinance was adopted for making a "safe and sane Fourth of July" in Marshfield. It was drawn by City Attorney Goss. Some of the councilmen thought that a firecracker an inch in diameter and four inches long was too large to be safe. Councilman Powers suggested that it be changed to "boy's size" but it was left unchanged.

Councilman Albrecht said that he opposed all kinds of fireworks and voted against the adoption of the ordinance but the other five councilmen voted for it.

**Waterworks Meeting.**

The council last evening adjourned for two weeks. Councilman Albrecht wanted to adjourn for only a week, saying that the waterworks situation was such that it needed early attention. Councilman Coke said that the thing to do was to have a special meeting of the councilmen called when the North Bend council-committee was ready to meet and discuss the matter as there would not be time to take it up in detail at a regular meeting. The other councilmen held the same view.

**Blake's Franchise.**

Jacob M. Blake did not present his application for an extension of his street car franchise last evening as had been rumored that he would.

A number of members of the council are understood to have expressed themselves that before they will grant another extension of the franchise, there will have to be a considerable and substantial amount of work done towards actual construction of the line. Just how many hold this view is not known but as it takes four members of the council to grant the extension, it is not unlikely that there will be a lively time when the matter does come up.

**Routing Proceedings.**

Councilman Cople asked that in the future all bills be read before the council voted thereon. Heretofore the council has been leaving the matter in the hands of the finance committee.

The question of ordering a new sewer on Fourth street and Commercial avenue from the laundry was discussed and finally left until Street Commissioner Lawhorne, who has been trying to fix it, returns from Coquille, where he is doing jury service.

On motion by Councilman Albrecht, a warrant for \$75 for the monthly maintenance of the Marshfield public library was ordered drawn.

Recorder Butler was instructed to invest the money in the refunding bond sinking fund in special improvement bonds at 95 cents on the dollar. There is about \$800 to be so invested.

Alias warrants were ordered issued for the collection of the assessments on North Broadway, on Second from Park to Highland, for the sewers between Broadway and Fifth and Anderson and Highland.

A warrant for \$1,350 for the payment of the interest on the city's \$54,000 bond issue was ordered drawn.

F. S. Dow was present and asked that before anything further was done about the Donnelly avenue improvement that the property owners be given a hearing. He thinks there is something wrong in it.

The following amounts were ordered paid contractors on the following work: Eleventh street, \$306; Alley in block 40, \$84; Central avenue, \$28; Storm sewers, \$92.50; Elrod avenue, \$395.

Henry Sengstacken argued in favor of the dredge fill.

Finally the motion to declare intention to improve Market avenue from Second to Seventh street and the intersecting streets from Commercial to Highland was adopted. One change in the previous plans for the improvement has been agreed upon and that is to have the street improved its full width in front of Dr. McCormac's home instead of having a divided street put in.
