RICHMOND TO HAVE FINE NEW BOULEVARD

Santa Fe to Move Station and Double Shops; Great Growth Predicted. (From San Francisco Examiner) RICHMOND, May 4.—The announcement by the Santa Fe that it is to build up and macadamize Ashland avenue at a cost of \$46,000 is gratifying to the residents of Richmond. It will mean that persons passing through on trains of the Santa Fe will get a more correct impression of the city, which has miles of bituminized streets. The work on Ashland avenue will give a new thoroughfare at least half a mile long, improved in the most modern style, and the station site of the Santa Fe will be moved to it and a handsome station building erected.

The moving of the station means that the land will be used in addition to be made to the Santa Fe shops, the capacity of which is to be doubled this year, meaning the employment of a great many more men. "The fortunes already made in Richmond are only a circumstance to those that are to be made," said John Nystrom, a pioneer of the city, in talking of this new street and other improvements today. "I have seen this place grow in ten years from a cattle pasture to a center of population with big industries on all hands. Most of the big growth has been in the last five years. In the next five years it will be far greater in proportion. No one can predict what the growth of Richmond will be in the next five years, but it will be great."
