SENATE FIGHT FINALLY ENDS

Solons do Not Have to Convene Until 2 O'clock—Tariff Is Scored.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 5.—After two years' fight the Senate adopted today the Bailey resolution fixing 2 p. m. as the hour of convening instead of noon. The new rule will be in effect "until otherwise ordered."

An attack on the republican policy of protection marked the continuation of the debate on the "free list" bill in the House today.

Representative Clayton of Alabama denounced as imposition what he declared to be a "prohibitive duty." "The republican party," he said, "makes a tariff to restrain the American market, to give unnatural and unequal benefits to favored interests that have been fostered by the protective system and allow them to exploit the American consumers by charging them excessive prices."

SKIN TO SPARE? HERE'S BIDDER.

Indiana Farmer is Paying \$10 Per Square Inch to Replace Burned Off Cuticle.

FORT WAYNE, Ind., May 5.—At the rate of \$10 a square inch Henry Prough, a farmer of La Grange, Ind., has spent \$230 for skin from his fellow men to replace cuticle he lost in an accident by fire. Two neighbors have spared a total of twenty-three square inches, and the Fort Wayne surgeon who is performing the skin grafting operation says much more will be needed, for which the sufferer will pay the rate he has established.

SIGNS UP AGREEMENT.

Major L. D. Kinney Said to Have Agreed to Trusteeship.

Major L. D. Kinney, it was announced today, this morning signed the final papers to place his property in the hands of W. J. Rust as trustee to effect a settlement for the benefit of creditors. The documents were placed in escrow pending the withdrawal of the bankruptcy proceedings, one of the provisions of the agreement.
