FEW SHOT IN FIGHT TODAY

Mexican Rebels Unexpectedly Start Battle Across the Border.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

EL PASO, Tex., May 8.—A few shots were exchanged by the Federal and Insurrecto-outposts again today, but orders were issued from headquarters to cease firing as an armistice was being arranged. Later on the firing was renewed. The Federals were said to have begun the shooting. Madero left headquarters for the front to determine whether his orders were disobeyed. It is believed his officers are taking advantage of the interim for an arrangement of an armistice to begin the attack. People crowded the roofs and house tops in El Paso and hundreds of persons ran to the river to watch the fighting.

Several bullets struck the United States immigration station. A Mexican was struck in the head by a bullet and a woman in the arm. The Insurrecto advance on Juarez apparently was being renewed at noon although earlier it appeared as though the Rebels were retiring.

Antonio Garcia was shot in the head and is dead from a Federal bullet. Louis Harandez was shot in the leg on the American side of the river.

At 12:30 it looked as if the firing was about to cease. Madero rode out to the front just after having made a statement he would agree to an armistice. The Insurrectos have chased some Federals out of their block houses toward Juarez and have sent to camp for reinforcements. The American troops lined the river bank keeping spectators as far back as possible.

TRIES TO ROB PORTLAND BANK

Cool Headed Cashier Thwarts Desperate Attempt This Afternoon.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

PORTLAND, Ore., May 8.—A bold attempt to rob the Eastside Bank this afternoon was frustrated by Cashier Fred W. Alt and President H. H. Newhall, both of whom took shots at the robber. Alt was busy at his desk when he was startled by a command to hand over a large sum of money. A big revolver in the hands of a powerful man did not unnerve the cashier who reached for a revolver and fired a shot at the would-be robber. President Newhall attracted by the command and the pistol shot also fired at the robber as he ran through the door to the street. The robber mounted a bicycle but was caught after a short chase. He gave the name of August Eckhart and said he conducted a machine shop in this city and was hard pressed for money. He is a German and 45 years of age.

BOOK PAPER PROTEST.

Manufacturer Says Canadian Reciprocity Would Kill Industry.

(By Associated Press to the Coos Bay Times.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 8.—Protests of book paper manufacturers against the Canadian reciprocity were made in the Senate Finance Committee today. George Sullivan representing the Philadelphia company said it costs Canadian manufacturers seven dollars a ton less to manufacture book paper than American manufacturers and that Americans would be put out of business. Sullivan said there are forty-six book paper mills in the United States with 30,000 employees. The only paper Americans export is bible paper.

PROFITS OF WELLS-FARGO

Figures Given In St. Paul Rate Hearing Show Wonderful Gains By It.

ST. PAUL, Minn., May 8.—How the Wells-Fargo Express company started with \$5,000,000 stock, increased it to \$24,000,000, paid 10 per cent dividends annually for sixteen years, declared a 310 per cent dividend last year, and then had \$3,600,000 cash surplus was indicated in evidence before the state railroad and warehouse commission at the express rate hearing here recently.

Long Contest Over Evidence.
Attorneys representing Minnesota and the Wells-Fargo company talked for days over getting in these admissions.

The Wells-Fargo company admitted that the original capitalization was \$5,000,000, at the time of the amalgamation with the western concerns. At that time a bonus of \$3,000,000 in stock was issued to the Southern Pacific railway company for consenting to the contract for hauling express parcels.

Declare 310 Per Cent Dividend.
For sixteen years dividends of 10 per cent annually were paid on \$3,000,000. In 1909, with an enormous surplus in the company's treasury, a dividend of 310 per cent was declared.
