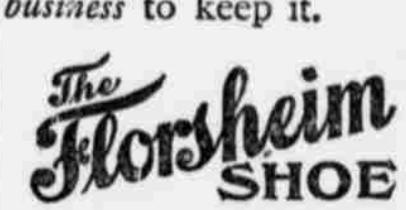

Bring Onyx.—Capt. Burkhardt of the steamer Excelsior brought in some fine samples of the Mexican onyx tris trip. He will place it on exhibition at the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce.

Below Average.—From September 1, 1910, to May 10, 1911, the total rainfall on Coos Bay was 57.73 inches. This is 3.42 inches less than the average rainfall for the period, according to the official records kept by Mrs. E. Mingus, local weather observer.

New Egg Record.—Mrs. John Nagle of Marshfield is the latest claimant of high records for the laying qualities of hens. In forty-seven days, she secured 528 eggs from sixteen hens and in that time received \$30.75 for the hen-fruit she sold from her flock.

Principal Resigns.—Miss Nellie A. Montgomery, principal of the Marshfield High school for the past two years, has tendered her resignation to the school board, effective at the close of the present school year. It is understood that she has been tendered a better position elsewhere.

Considerable Pioneer.—Dal Cathcart says he thinks he is entitled to a place among the pioneers. It was just 58 years ago Monday that he and his party crossed the Missouri river on the long overland trail to Oregon. They crossed the river ten miles above where Omaha is now located but that place was not on the map at that time.

Flanagan, treasurer of his company, returns from a San Francisco business trip.
