JOHN DIETZ CONVICTED OF MURDER BY WISCONSIN JURY

"Defender of Cameron Dam" Faces Life Imprisonment For Killing.

HE PLEADED HIS OWN CASE WITHOUT LAWYER

Refused New Trial But Is Given Time to File Bill of Exceptions.

HAYWARD, Wis., May 13.—The jury trying John Dietz, Mrs. Dietz and Leslie Dietz on the charge of murder brought in a verdict of guilty in the first degree against John Dietz and not guilty against Mrs. Dietz and Leslie.

Dietz will spend the rest of his life at hard labor for the murder of Deputy Oscar Harp in the battle of "Cameron Dam" October 8 last. The trouble dates back to 1904, when Dietz refused to let lumber companies operating in Sawyer county, Wis., to float logs over the Cameron dam, located on a quarter section bought by Mrs. Dietz, without paying the toll he demanded. In attempts to capture him on various charges and legal processes, Oscar Harp, deputy sheriff, was killed and several men wounded, Myra Dietz was shot through the body, Clarence Dietz wounded, and John Dietz shot in the hand. It was the tenth armed effort to take Dietz and he became a prisoner. Before Dietz was sentenced he said it was the fight of a powerful organization against a lone man. He made a motion for a new trial which was denied, but given ten days in which to file an exception. Judge Reid advised him to employ an attorney. He has defended himself, saying he cannot afford an attorney.

DICKINSON IS ABOUT TO QUIT

SECRETARY OF WAR RETIRES AND HENRY L. STIMPSON WILL SUCCEED HIM IN TAFT CABINET.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 13.—Secretary Dickinson is engaged today in closing his administration of the War Department preparatory to relinquishing the office to Henry L. Stimson, his successor. The change will occur early next week.

CLASH IS DENIED.

M. Dickinson as Secretary of War. This statement was made here today by one of the secretary's close intimates. No break in the relations of Taft and Dickinson inspires the resignation, it is said.

MURDERER IS ACQUITTED.

J. E. Quick returned from Eureka, California, Tuesday. He had been to attend the trial of Henry Sanders who shot and killed his brother, Henry Quick, formerly of this place, the 11th of last February. The parties had been having trouble previous to the shooting, and the verdict of the jury was acquittal on the plea of self defense.—Coquille Sentinel.

SHOOTS YOUTH INSTEAD OF CAT

Chinese Boys Trying to Kill Felina Injures Young Chinaman.

Gee Gow and his cousin, the latter a son of Gee Fee, the North Second street "Washee man" were trying to shoot a cat last night with a 22-caliber revolver.

Instead of shooting the cat, their efforts ended in a 22 bullet hitting Gee Fee's boy in the chest and imbedding itself in the flesh near the heart.

Had the young Chinamen had a larger revolver, Gee Fee's boy would probably have been killed. As it is, his injury is not considered serious.

Marshal Carter served notice on the Chinese contingent today that he would not permit any more shooting around there.

TWO STRICKEN IN NORTH BEND

Mrs. B. Vonder Green, Pioneer Woman, Passes Away Suddenly There.

Mrs. B. Vonder Green, a well known pioneer of Coos and Curry counties died suddenly this morning at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Thomas Chapman, in North Bend of a complication of diseases incident to her advanced years. She had a severe attack of la grippe during the winter but thought that she had recovered from it and was planning to leave on the Breakwater today to visit a daughter in Portland. Yesterday afternoon while visiting at the home of a neighbor, Mrs. Emery, she suffered a chill, went home and rapidly grew worse until the end came.

She was born in Munich, Germany and was seventy-four years old. With her husband, she came west in 1866 and settled in Coos county. Her husband, who died a few years ago was the only practicing physician in Curry county for seventeen years. Four daughters survive her.

The funeral will probably be held Monday.

Wm. Jones Dead.

Wm. Jones, aged 74, died at his home in North Bend late yesterday afternoon after a lingering illness of kidney trouble and other complications. He underwent an operation sometime ago but never regained his health.

Mr. Jones was a tinner by trade but for several years he had followed it actively. With his family he came to North Bend from Ohio about nine years ago. Besides his wife, he is survived by a son, Randal Jones, and a brother, Joshua Jones, in North Bend. Other relatives reside in the east.

The funeral was held at 2 o'clock this afternoon from the G. W. Dungan Undertaking parlors in Marshfield.

BIG REVOLT IN REBEL RANKS

MEXICAN INSURRECTOS IN UPRISING AGAINST MADERO'S CABINET AND THE LATTER ARE DECLARED OUSTED.

JUAREZ, Mex., May 13.—A rebellion within the ranks of Madero's army today resulted in the declaring under arrest of Francisco I. Madero, Jr., provisional president. The demand was that Madero's cabinet resign and for two hours it threatened the destruction of the Juarez army as a concrete fighting force. The excitement about the Madero headquarters was first observed about 11 o'clock. General Pasqual Orozco and other military chiefs were seen in vehement discussion with Provisional President Madero which gave rise to a report that the Insurrecto soldiers had demanded the life of General Navarro. The latter was said to be in disfavor with many Insurrectos for alleged acts of cruelty in previous battles in northern Mexico, particularly at Cierro Prieta where General Navarro is said to have ordered that the wounded be bayoneted.

Lead By Orozco.

The insipient rebellion arose in the ranks of the forces under General Orozco, one of the fighting leaders of the Madero army and was headed by Orozco himself. A demand was made on Provisional President Madero for money for his ragged and hungry soldiers.

Madero was unable to satisfy these demands at the time but his explanation preemptorily thrown aside by the belligerent Orozco and his followers, and Madero was declared under arrest. Finally Madero settled with promise from Madero that the immediate needs of the soldiers would be attended to.

The Insurrectos who had gathered in hundreds around the headquarters, dispersed. Trouble, which has been brewing for some time, culminated today in the demonstration at the Madero headquarters. The Insurrectos do not like the composition of Madero's cabinet and asserted that favoritism was shown against officers and men in the Rebel army.

Cabinet Is Ousted.

Orozco demanded the immediate resignation of the Madero cabinet, saying scornfully they are incompetent. Madero hereafter must pay more attention to the needs of his soldiers. To this demand Madero acquiesced and finally the provisional president and his general embraced in true Latin fashion and the insipient rebellion came to an end with the understanding that the cabinet would cease to exist and that the troops would be looked after. How deeply the rebellion permeated the ranks of the Insurrectos outside of Orozco's command is not known. From talk, the soldiers appear dissatisfied with the conduct of affairs the last few days. Soldiers say the feeling is so widespread as to affect nearly the entire Insurrecto fighting forces in Juarez.

DENIES HEAVY DESERTION.

C., May 13.—Published reports of the wholesale desertions of American troops in Texas to the Madero forces across the line were quieted today when Adjutant General Ainsworth Wade made public figures showing only 37 desertions from all the troops on the border and in San Antonio and Galveston during the first twelve days of May and only 120 during the entire two preceding months.

TO GET FREE MAIL SERVICE

Chamber of Commerce Asks For Carrier Delivery for Marshfield.

At a meeting of the executive committee of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce yesterday, steps were taken to secure free mail delivery for Marshfield. The secretary, Miss Violet Henderson, was instructed to take the matter up at once with the Post-office Department at Washington and also with the members of the Oregon Congressional delegation. A letter setting forth the many reasons why Marshfield is entitled to free mail delivery and the fact that the postal receipts here exceeded \$14,000 or \$4,000 more than enough required, will be sent at once.

Chairman Jennings reported that he had recently taken up with Adjutant General Finzer the matter of having the cruiser Boston, which is to be the training ship of the Oregon Naval Reserves, stationed at Coos Bay. In response to his letter, Adjutant General Finzer wrote: "Your application will be submitted to the proper authorities and it will be given due consideration. As soon as a decision in the matter has been arrived at, I will be glad to inform you."

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Comparatively Easy Victor In Coos Athletic Contests Here Friday.

NORTH BEND SECOND AND COQUILLE THIRD

Threatening Rain and Heavy Track Detracts From Annual Event.

The Bandon High school again carried off the field honors, taking first place in 10 events and totaling in all 52 points at the Coos County Field Meet here yesterday. North Bend was second with 31 points, and Coquille third with 16 points.

Most of the events were hard fought for, and the finishes were all close. In the 100 and 220 yard dashes, Gallier of Bandon was hard pressed by both Newkirk and Hodson of North Bend. Tom Laird again took the mile, and standing broad jump as well as the pole vault and high jump. In the two latter he showed excellent form but in the mile run his brother, Roy of Coquille, was not far behind. Bowman of Bandon beat his last year's record in the 440 by one second, and also took the half mile and shot put. In the shotput, Oerding of Coquille made the best put but stepped out of the ring three times successively and was disqualified.

The hurdle race was called off after three trials as the hurdles brought over by the different teams were not standard and no fair decision could be made. The mile relay was one of the most exciting events of the day. Coquille started out strong, leading by a big margin on the first two laps but the third man missed his flag and lost so much ground in recovering it that his team was out of the running. On the last lap Bowman and Newkirk finished close together, the Bandon man winning out by a couple of strides.

As a whole, this year's records do not equal those of last, due to the fact that the track was heavy on account of the rain. There was a fair crowd out, but it lacked the spirit that would have been manifested and had the weather man carried a little sunshine on his countenance.
