PROGRESSIVE EDUCATION.

It is instructive to look over the report of the United States Commissioner of Education for 1910 with reference to the teaching of agriculture in the public and the high schools of the various states. The report shows that great interest is being taken. The southern states are especially progressive. Some of them have an agricultural school for every congressional district. They give state aid to these schools. They require an examination in agriculture for teachers' certificates. Of the northern states, Wisconsin is especially progressive. The Y. M. C. A. is doing a fine work along the same line and many railroads are offering liberal scholarships, in states crossed by their lines, to young men who will pursue the short courses offered in agriculture in Agricultural Colleges. The St. Louis and San Francisco railroad offered 45, \$100 scholarships for the winter 1910-1911. Some railroads have their own experiment farms. The "back to the soil" movement is a very real thing in this country. One wonders if our own school ought not to be doing something very definite along the same line.

Reaches Bandon.—The steamer Elizabeth arrived at Bandon yesterday from San Francisco.

Funeral Sunday.—The funeral of A. H. Smith of North Bend, who died Friday, will be held at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon from the Dungan Undertaking parlors in Marshfield.
