LIVELY CHASE AFTER THIEF

Bandon Marshal and Deputy Sheriff Unable to Capture Burglar There.

BANDON, Ore., May 15.—An exciting time was experienced last night by Marshal Holman and Deputy Sheriff Blackerby in chasing a young fellow by the name of Dedman, who had broken into the Woolen Mill, the old Shingle Mill and Bingaman's store Wednesday night, and had taken a number of articles which he had hidden under a boat near the old shingle mill. The robbed had taken a paint brush from Phillipott's paint shop and the paint having dripped on to the plank walk served as a trail by which the stolen goods were found. Marshal Holman and Mr. Blackerby were then on the lookout for the thief with the intention of getting him last night, as it was thought he would probably be after the goods after dark; however, he came about 7:00 o'clock in the evening, before they were expecting him. Marshal Holman saw some one coming but supposed it was Mr. Blackerby until he found himself face to face with Dedman who had a chisel in his hand which Holman grabbed, and then Dedman stuck a gun in his face; this Holman also grabbed and then the tussel began until the men came, to the edge of the wharf, where Dedman jumped off; Holman then pulled his gun and ordered Dedman to stop, but that gentleman kept right on going; Holman then fired, time rather to scare him, and then fired two more shots, at his legs, neither of which took effect. Dedman kept on running until he got into the woods and may be at Roseburg by this time. Marshal Holman says he had every opportunity to kill Dedman, but did not feel justified in doing so under the circumstances, in which belief he will no doubt be supported by all cool-headed thinkers, as he proved himself to be. After Holman fired the third shot Dedman dropped his gun and when it was picked up it was found to be empty, but of course Holman had no way of knowing that when the muzzle was sticking in his face, and it looked just as big as if it had been "loaded to the muzzle."—Bandon Recorder.
