Fourth Annual Convention at Myrtle Point.

COUNTY STOCK ASSOCIATION.

Meeting Will Be Held at Myrtle Point to Organize.

On last Saturday, a meeting of a number of the horse men of Coos county was held at Myrtle Point to consider ways and means for the organization of a stock breeders' association in this county.

Preliminary plans were discussed and a permanent organization was affected, B. H. Haskins being chosen temporary chairman and Percy Ward, temporary secretary.

It was decided to hold the next meeting at the City Hall in Myrtle Point on Tuesday, May 26th. The main object of this meeting will be to further go over the plans looking toward the permanent organization, and to take steps preparatory to the holding of a stock shown in conjunction with the dairy institute to be held here some time in July.—Myrtle Point Enterprise.

STATE POULTRY FARMS.

Oregon Institutions to Raise Own Supplies.

PORTLAND, May 15.—The state of Oregon may soon be in the market for 10,000 chickens. Preliminary inquiry has been made as to the possibilities of poultry raising at the various state institutions and it is quite probable that the various farms will be stocked soon. To supply the Reform School, the Insane Hospital, the Tubercular Sanitarium and the Feeble Minded Institution with poultry farms would require between 8,000 and 10,000 hens, according to the estimate made by Prof. James Dryden, head of the Department of Poultry Husbandry at the Oregon Agricultural College, and that institution will cooperate fully in helping those institutions to raise their own poultry and eggs.

GOOD TUNES AHEAD.

New York Financier Impressed With Outlook.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 15.—Good times and general prosperity were forecasted by James G. Cannon, president of the Fourth National bank of New York city, upon his arrival in Portland from San Francisco on an extended tour of the Pacific coast. He bases his prophecy on crop conditions, banking and merchandizing, all three of which he declared he had found in first class condition. Mr. Cannon is traveling over the country to look into business conditions, so as to be able to direct his financial transactions intelligently and from first hand knowledge of affairs.

APPLE SELLING IN LONDON.

An U. S. Consular Report says: The apple is by far the most important fruit coming to the British market. American apples are very popular, led by such varieties as the Newtown Pippin and the Hood River. The only objection urged is that of size. The most popular sizes are those ranging from 120 to 150 a crate, whereas some of the arrivals from Oregon and California run as large as 70 or 80 a crate. The English retail trade does not want the extra large apple. Fruit is sold by the pound and the number of a fruit that can be contained in a fixed weight plays a large part in its sale.
