STAGE INTO CANYON.

Driver Killed and Passengers Hurt Near Grants Pass.

GRANTS PASS, Ore., May 16. —Swinging down Hays Hill, a half mile above Loves station, the Crescent City stage, drawn by four horses and driven by John Loudon, was thrown with its passengers and freight into a rocky canyon, 300 feet deep. The stage driver probably was fatally injured, two passengers were maimed, one horse was killed, the remainder of the team was injured and stage and mail bags were demolished.

The mishap is attributed to the breaking of a brake block, which precipitated the stage and its load against the wheel horses with such force that they could not check its progress.

DEVELOP NEW LINES.

Kruttchnitt Wants to See Business They Will Do.

A Portland paper says: "Further railroad construction in Central Oregon may depend largely upon the patronage given those lines recently completed and now being built, according to the statements of Julius Kruttchnitt, vice-president and director of maintenance and operation of the Harriman system, who arrived in Portland from a trip over the O.-W. R. & N. main line and branches. "Our work of the last few years represents a large investment," said Mr. Kruttchnitt, "and I think we should see first what the country does in the way of response before planning anything further."

Construction of an east and west line across Oregon, which has been spoken of repeatedly by various railroad officials is not included in any plans now under consideration, declared Mr. Kruttchnitt."
