BRINGS UP OLD ISSUES AGAIN

ing for fining the proprietors of disorderly houses the first of each month. This did not meet general favor and finally Marshal Carter said that Prosecuting Attorney Brown informed him that if this was done, the officials would be called before the grand jury to prosecute the alleged resorts. Then it was suggested that the resorts be required to pay a liquor license. No definite action was taken however.

Routine Business.
A request from A. J. Drews for a permit to construct a boat landing at the foot of Cedar avenue was referred to the waterfront committee. Mayor Straw and Fire Chief Traver recently sold several lengths of condemned fire hose to Bandon parties. Last night, Councilman Albrecht wanted to know about it and suggested that henceforth that no city property be sold until the sale was approved by the council.

The amendment to the liquor ordinance fixing the license at \$800 per annum after July 1 was passed. Albrecht and Ferguson, who opposed the increase voted against the amendment but all the others voted in favor of it.

The Fourth street sewer matter was referred to the health committee. This is the sewer leading from the Coos Bay Laundry which has been stopped up a number of times. It probably will be necessary to construct a new sewer on Fifth street. Councilman Albrecht said that the trouble was due partly to the fact that cracked pipe had been put in when the sewer was built and also to the fact that the laundry did not screen the lint, etc., from the wash water. It is also proposed to repair or build a new sewer on Fourth street North of Commercial before it is paved.

Fire Chief Traver reported that the new fire engine was to be shipped from the east about May 20.

A rebate was ordered paid on the South Eleventh street improvement, there being a balance of \$11.10 in the fund. Dr. Geo. E. Dix has four lots in it and will receive three cents rebate on two of them and four cents on two of them. The highest rebate is about seventy-six cents per lot.

It was ordered that henceforth parties having bills against the city shall present them the first of each month instead of allowing them to accumulate. The bills are also to be read in open council before being ordered paid. Councilmen Ferguson and Conple instisting on it.

A surplus in the special improvement bond fund was ordered used to buy in special improvement bonds.

Councilman Albrecht stated that current expenses would have to be trimmed as the city's expenses for the first five months had exceeded \$9,000. He said that for the first three months, the city's expenses were greater than a year ago. Councilmen Conple and Coke suggested that the city cut out paying hall rent for the Naval Reserves. Councilman Ferguson opposed it and no action was taken but it is not likely, from the expressions last night, that it will be allowed again.

Mayor Straw was not present last night, being out of the city on a hunting trip. The council adjourned to meet again the first Tuesday in June.

SIUSLAW NOW IS HELD BACK

Harbor Improvements There Delayed By Coos Bay Port Case.

F. K. Gettins, who returned from Florence yesterday reports that there is consternation there as a result of the Port of Siuslaw harbor improvements being held up by the litigation involving the Port of Coos Bay. Practically the same questions that were left undecided by the recent supreme court decision and which are involved in the suit begun by the State of Oregon vs. the Port of Coos Bay as in the latter case.
In consequence of this, the buyers of the last bond issue now refuse to take the bonds until the case is decided. The money was all ready for delivery to the Siuslaw Port Commission when the last question was raised and it will now be held up.
All of the previous bond money has been expended and the work, it is claimed, will have to come to a halt. The contractors say the delay will mean a loss of \$50,000.

PLANS FOR PEACE.

Draft of International Agreement Is Submitted Today.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 17.—The draft of a general arbitration treaty was submitted today to the British and French governments through the ambassadors here as a basis of negotiations for permanent agreement treaties on general lines. Questions of honor and vital interest are to be subjected to arbitration. The Hague tribunal will decide the issue.

FINE RANCH IS BOUGHT TODAY

Andrew Stora and Alfred Branell Buy Herrman Property On Coos River.

Andrew Stora and Alfred Branell have closed a deal for the purchase of what is known as the Chandler ranch on Coos River from Christian Herrmann and wife.

The ranch, which is one of the best on Coos River, consists of 133 acres, about one-half of which is bottom land. The price paid is understood to have been \$18,500, an increase of \$3,500 over what Mr. and Mrs. Herrman paid for it a couple of years ago when they bought it from Irving Chandler and Frank Laise. The latter are understood to have made a profit of \$3,000 on it so that the value of the property has advanced over fifty per cent the last few years.

Besides the ranch, the purchasers get thirty head of Jersey cattle and all the farm implements, etc. Mr. Branell, who is a brother of Mrs. Stora, will operate the ranch. He will soon be married.

Mr. and Mrs. Herrmann will move to Marshfield where they will make their home for the time being.
