Wed Here.—Albert W. Johnson of the Coquille Soda Works, and Miss Laura Deebeler of Coquille were married here Sunday, the Rev. H. I. Rutledge of the Marshfield Methodist church officiating. They will reside at Coquille.

Mother Is Dead.—Word was received under by the death of Mrs. Carrie Sexton, mother of Mrs. Nellie Owen, which occurred at Hugo, Oregon, Saturday. Mrs. Owen reached there shortly before her death. The funeral was held today.

To Start Survey.—Engineer Leefer has been advised that Frank Saunders and a small party have been ordered to report here as soon as possible to make the new hydrographic survey of the upper part of Coos Bay from the Smith mill to a point just below Pony Inlet.

Case Is Heard.—The case of John Kronholm vs. D. L. Foote is being heard before Justice Penneck today. Mr. Kronholm alleges that he sent a suit of clothes to Foote to be pressed and the latter only returned part of it and when this was taken back to get the remainder that Foote sold it to Jas Faulkner who bought Foote's establishment.

Buoy Moved.—The captain of the Dredge Oregon reports that during the recent storm Red Buoy No. 10 1/2 at Pony Inlet was swept out of position by the wind and storm. He endeavored to save it but was unable to do so. The matter will probably be taken up at once as the buoy was an important aid to navigation for the larger vessels in the lower Bay.

Resigns Position.—E. J. Mayfield has resigned as bookkeeper and office manager for F. S. Dow, effective June 1. He expects to spend the early part of June rustivating on Coos River or at Ten Mile after which he and his wife and baby will probably return to California to reside. His decision to leave here will be regretted by the many friends they have made during their residence on the Bay.
